

#### IN MEMORIAM

#### Mrs. J. L. Reddy

Mrs. J. L. Reddy was elected to the Board of Education in April, 1922, and served continuously as a member of that body until the time of her death on January 24, of the present year.

Mrs. Reddy was a woman who was intensely interested in the welfare of the Community in which she lived and she always gave freely of her time and strength for any cause which resulted in any form of community betterment. She possessed a keen knowledge of educational affairs and because of this and her sympathetic interest in educational problems she was a most valuable member of the Board of Education. During the last year of her life she was forced on account of failing health to give up many of the activities in which she had been engaged. However she continued to render service as a member of the Board of Education long after many of her other activities had been given up.

In all of her decisions and deliberations as a member of the Board, Mrs. Reddy was actuated by the highest motives. The educational advancement of the children of the community always came first with her and her every effort was directed toward securing the best possible educational opportunity for the young people of David City.

It was with a sense of distinct personal loss that the students of the David City High School learned of her passing and yet we rejoice with her family and friends in the knowledge of a life that had been devoted to service for others and the sureness of her reward in the life to come.







#### History of the Junior Class

### PIGSKIN SQUEALS

David City began this years grid-iron history with a decisive victory over the Stromsburg eleven. The weight and experience of the local team gave them an easy 48 to 0 win.

After suffering defeat from Stanton two years in succession, David City turned the tables this year by giving them a 19 to 6 drubbing. The first half was scoreless, but early in the last half David fumbled on punt-formation and Stanton recovered for their only touchdown. The Red and Black refused to be beaten, however, and, mixing passes with off-tackle smashes, marched down the field for the tieing touchdown. Two other long marches followed, each ending with the ball over the counting line.

The Columbus game was, beyond doubt, the hardest fought battle on the local field this year. The David City goal was never in danger during the game but the Discoverers are not the kind to give up easily. The visitors were unable to gain against the stone-wall defense of the David City line, while the Red and Black ball-luggers piled up a 14 to 0 victory.

The next game was more of a track meet, David City running up some 79 points. Geneva also ran.

With the help of Lady Luck and Old Man Weather, Central City ruined all championship hopes for the David City squad with a 26 to 7 defeat on the Central City field. Central City had not forgotten their dereat at the hands of David City the year before, when they also had championship aspirations.

In a rather listless game Ashland fell before the David City avalanche, the final score: Ashland 7, David City 36.

Remembering the 10 to 7 defeat from Wahoo last year, the David City squad entered Saunders county with revenge in their hearts. In the opening minutes of play, Wahoo fumbled on their own ten yard line—David City recovering for the first touchdown. The kick was good and David led with 7 points. However, Wahoo's defense tightened and the half ended with the score unchanged. Wahoo came back in the second half with a bag full of passes, only to have one intercepted for the Red and Black's second touchdown. With perfect interference, the backfield plunged and plowed through the Wahoo line for 3 more touchdowns, leaving the score: David City 33, Wahoo 0.

Ulysses next fell before Coach Elliott's machine although David failed to pile up the number of points expected. The final score: David City 27, Ulysses 0.

David City closed this year's football season with an easy 41 to 0 victory over the Seward eleven.

In the nine games played the Red and Black was humbled only once. In the nine games the home team piled up a total of 304 points to their opponents 39. Six of the nine teams failed to score. 146 lbs. Guard "Tuffy" has the honor of being the only Freshie to make a letter in this year's football. No, he doesn't graduate.


#### DOCTOR C. E. BEEDE

For the first game David City drew Falls City and, on the first floor of the new Field


House defeated them with a score of 26 to 11.




