## FOOTBALL

Sept. 19-Fullerton-The Scauts opened their season by downing Fullaton 6 to $U$. Walaen's expert punting put Fullerton on their one yard line in the fourth quarter. Froctor recovered a fumole on the twelve yard line for the Scouts. From there Walden carried the ball to the two and went over on the next play.

Sept. 26-Central City-The Scouts subdued Central City 18 to 0 . The game opened with the Scouts kicking. A fumble on the first play and David City took possession of the ball on the ten yard line. Six yards off tackle were made by Ptacek, then Walden went over on a reveise. Try for an extra point failed. Novel made the next score on a perfect spinner play. The try for point was no good. The game went on until the third quarter when Walden intercepted a pass and raced ' 15 yards for the final touchdown.

Oct. 8-Wahoo-David City won the third straight game when they defeated Wahoo. The Scouts' team made three thrzats before they were able to score in the latter pait of the fourth quarter. Wahoo played an excellent defense game aqainst the Scouts. Novel madz the touchdown on a line plunge and Richards carried the ball over for the extra point.

Oct. 10-Ainsworth-The Scouts romped on Ainsworth 24 to 0 . The sandhill boys were beaten on the Scouts home field. The first score was made by Novel after a 55 yard touchdown march of off tackle smashes, reyerses, and razzle-dazzle early in the first quarter. Walden scored the second near the last of the opening half on a 23 yard dash A neat reverse by Novel and the score was 19 to 0 . The last score was made by Walden early in the last quarter.

Oct. 17-Columbus-It was double threat for Columbus when the Scouts trampled them 26 to 6 and put their ace Fred Brock, out with a dislocated shouldsr. Columbus had only one bright spot, when Kenfield made a touchdown following a series of passes. The first score was made by McVay
