They were ably guided through the year by Miss Hoffman and Mr. Pritchard, the class sponsors.


On September 1, 1941, forty-five girls and thirty boys entered the David City High School. Shortly after school opened, the freshmen held their first class meeting and elected officers as follows:




The first class party was held Wednesday, January 7, and the freshmen really got acquainted with each other and decided that school wasn't such a bad place after all.


Twenty-six boys participated in athletics, six freshmen in Choir, thirteen freshmen in Girls' Glee Club and three freshmen played in band.






