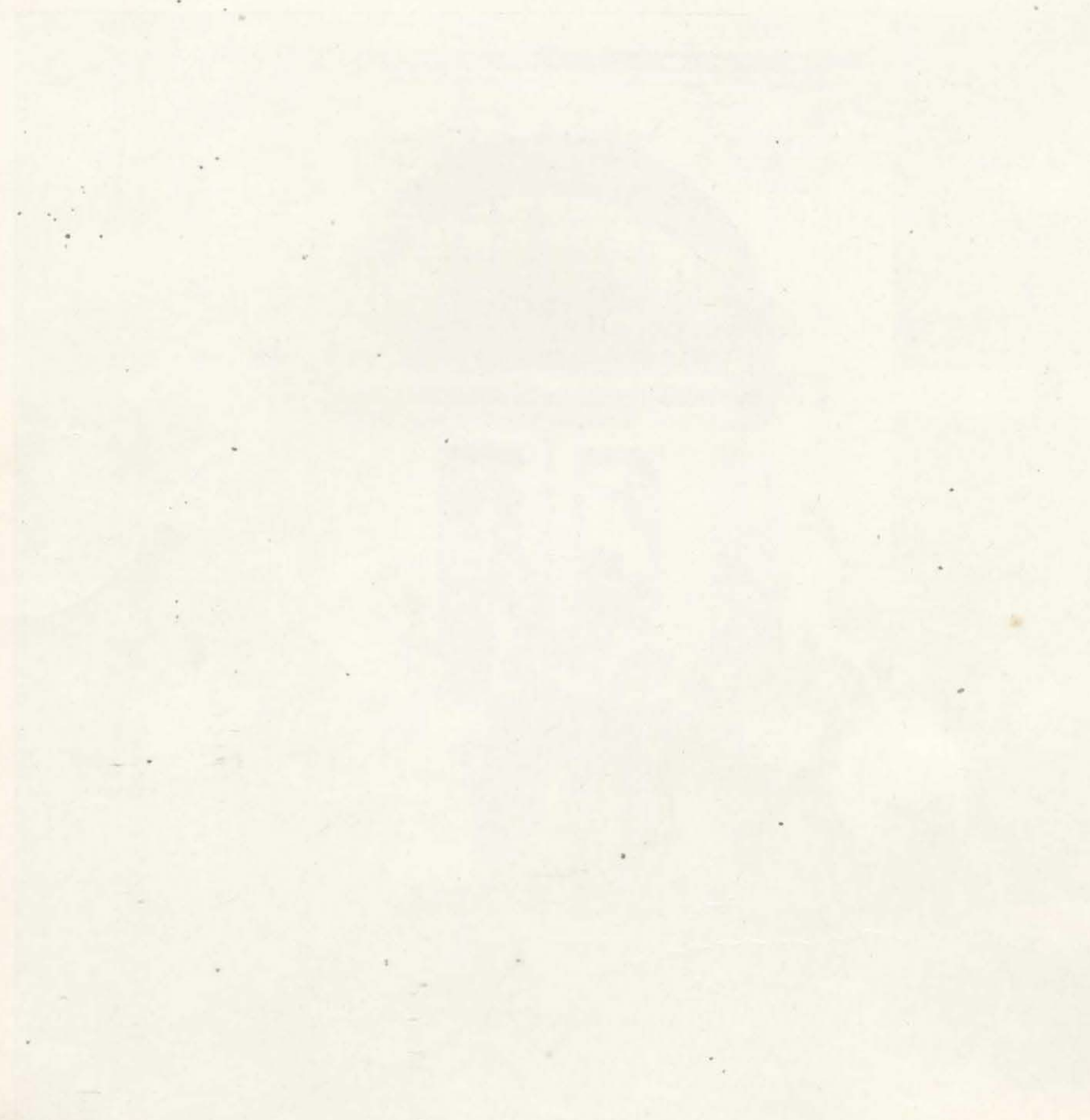

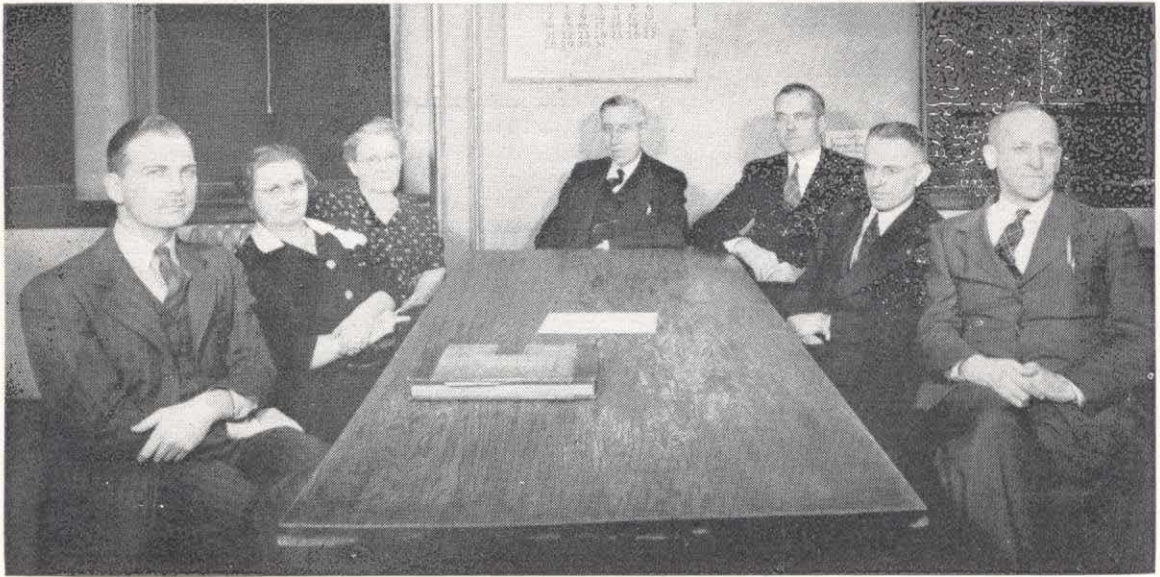

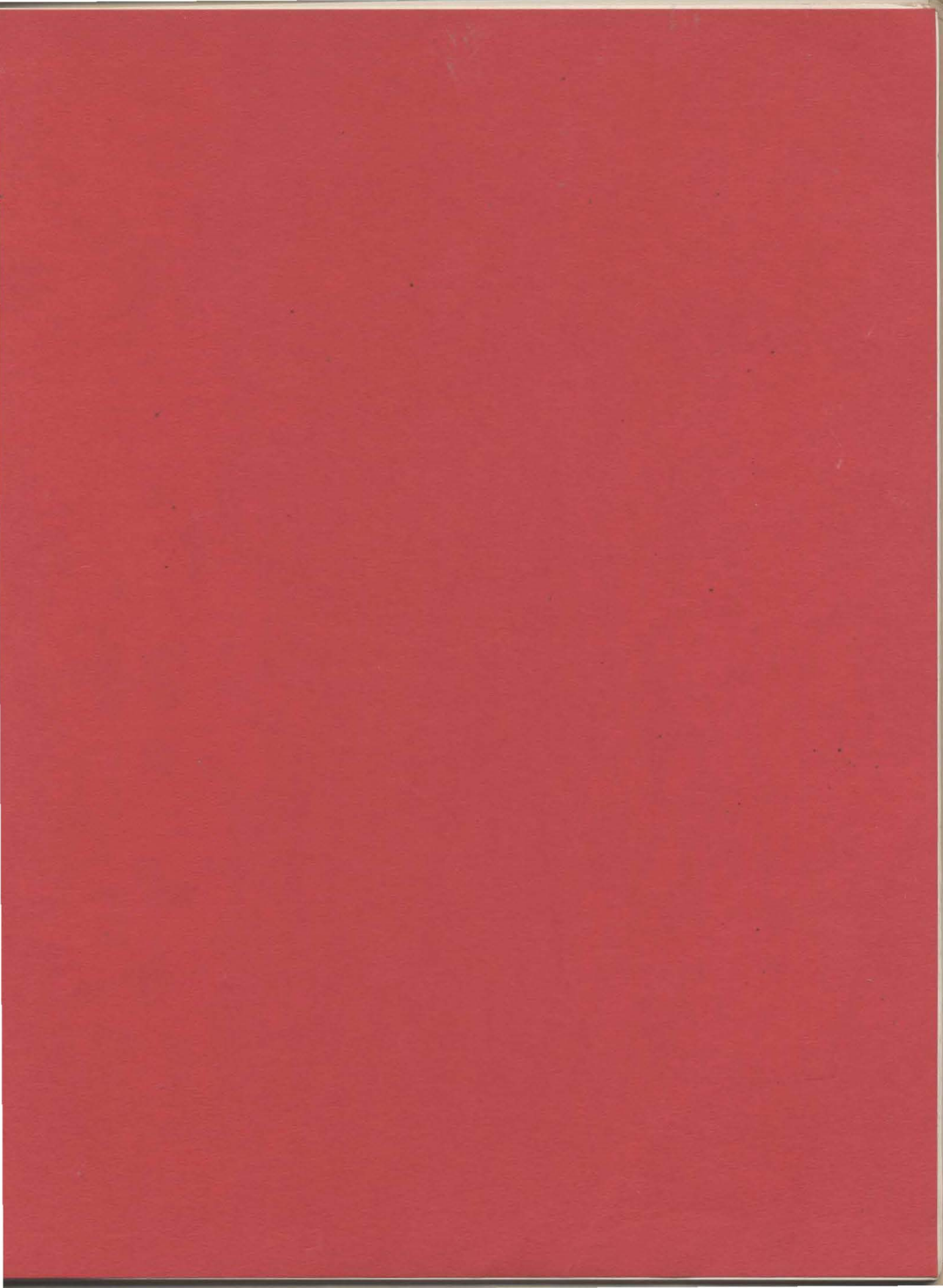

1st Raid

The paratroopers consisted of 79 eager and inexperienced freshmen. Twelve appeared with the football squad, and one on the first team of the David City basketball squad. A class party was successfully planned and scored a direct hit. The first raid was considered successful by all high officials.

The paratroopers of this raid were found to be more familiar with the fighting tactics. Seventy-six took part in the raid. Three of these received letters in football and one in basketball. A large number of our troop participated in the battle District Music Contest at Columbus. It was unanimously decided that the city's defenses were weakening.

Much increased confidence was found evident among the paratroopers of this raid. The troop consisted of 80 persevering boys and girls. They were represented by six lettermen on the football squad and three on the basketball squad. Two Juniors rated high in the state commercial contests. Other outstanding features were the presentation of the Junior-Senior banquet and winning the contest of Defense Stamp purchases. The raid reduced the city's defenses to mere warfare in its outskirts.

Due to ration difficulties the troop called their "sneak day" on the early date of November 3. Ten boys of our troop have registered for army service. In the overture, "Words and Music", five seniors took leading parts. It is agreed that the next objective is achieving success in future life.
