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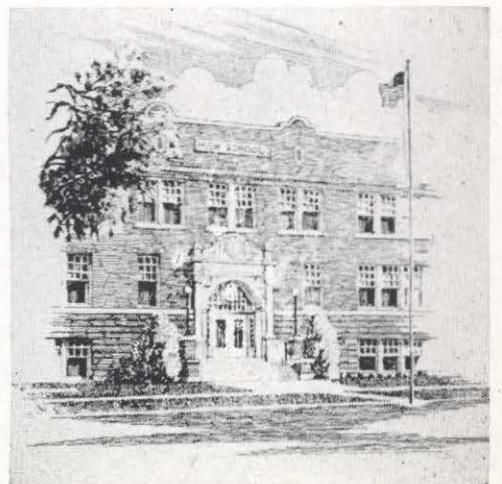
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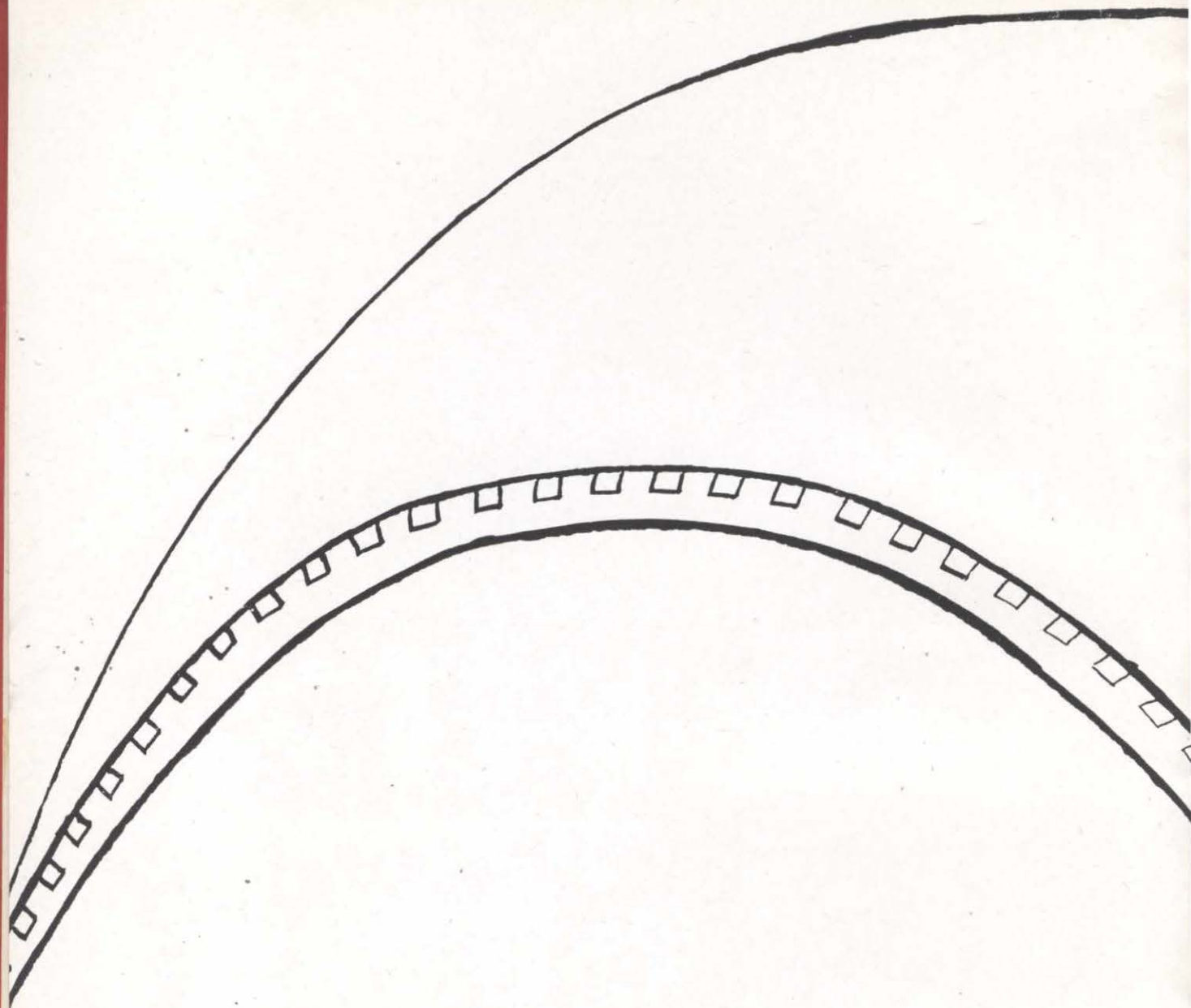
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# **THE SCOUT**

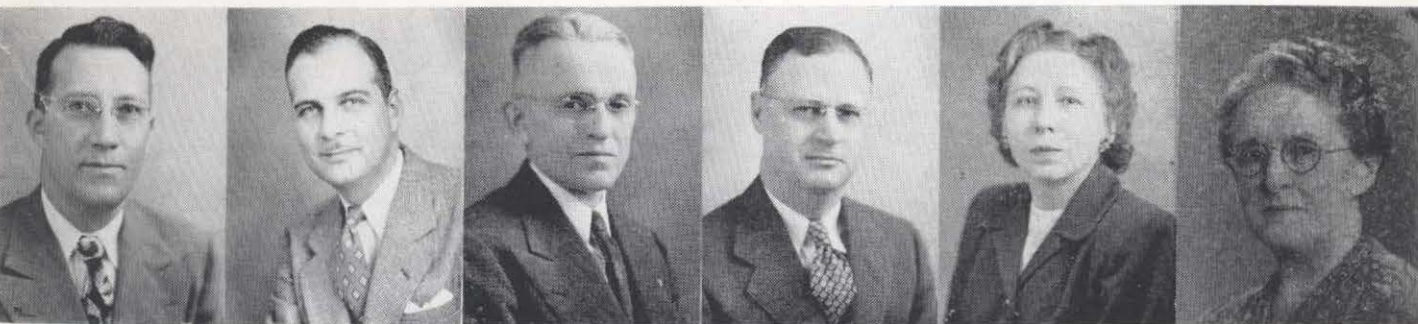

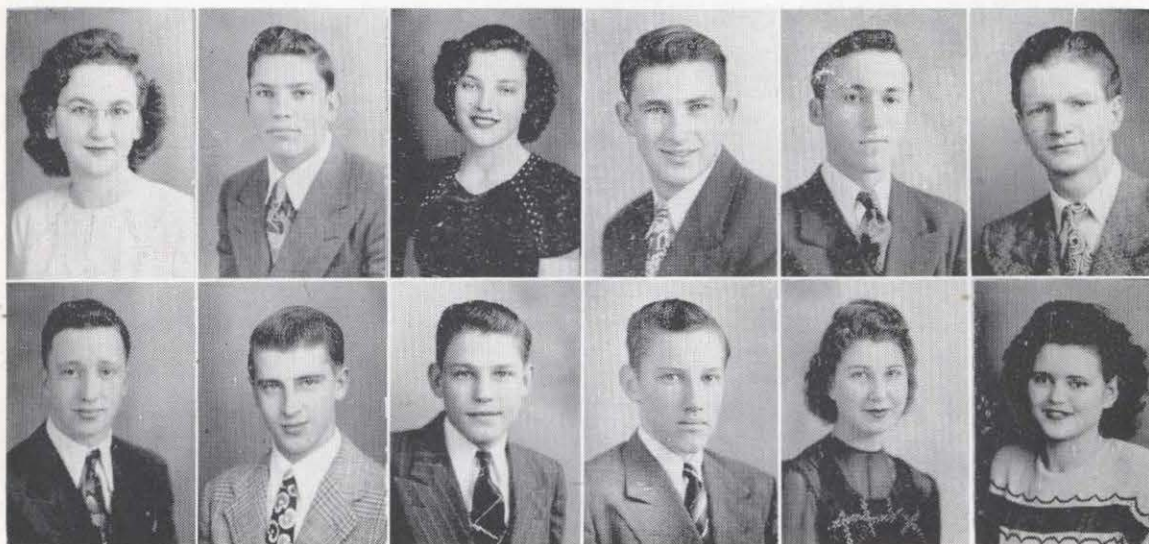

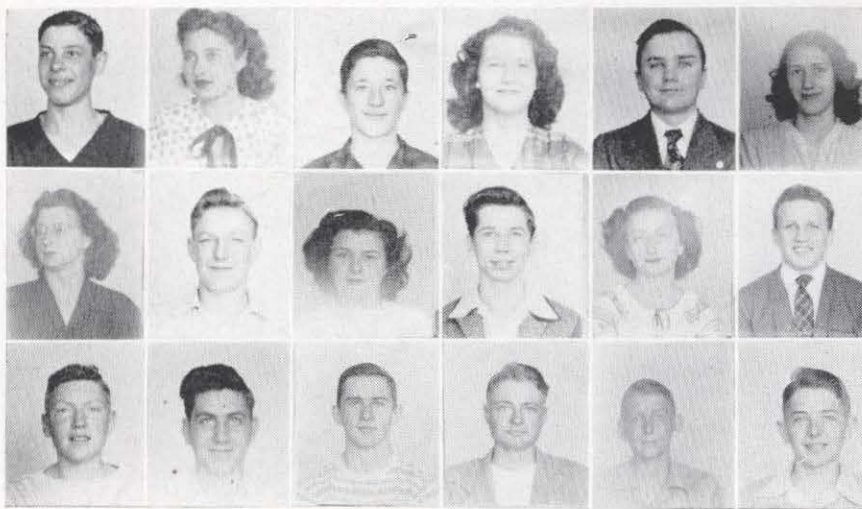

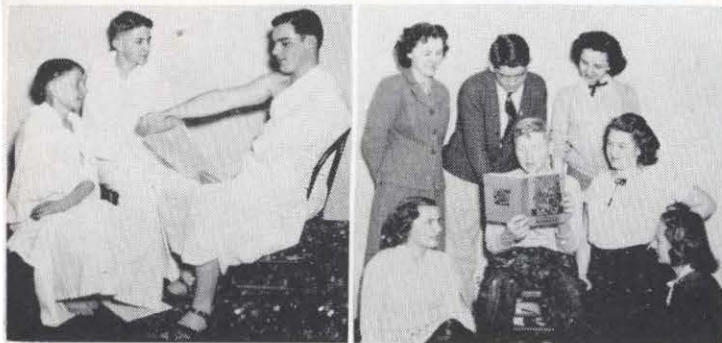
Miss Elaine Dobes headed the English department, with the able assistance of Mr. Jack Kennedy and Miss Mairi Pitcaithley.

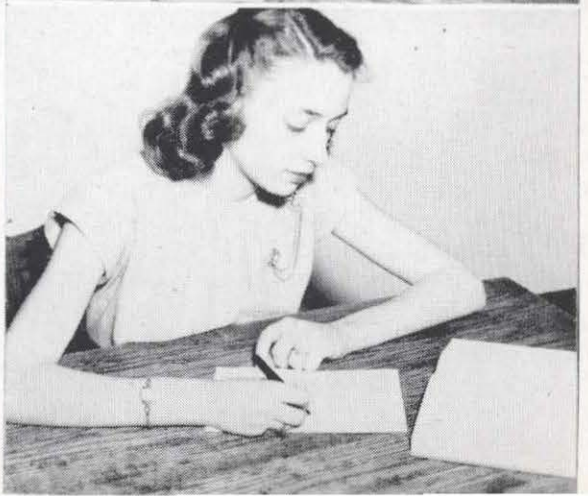
After using this well-equipped office, students easily adjust themselves to future stenographical positions.

All pupils who wish to enroll for normal training must have had averages of at least 80 in their freshman and sophomore years; they must pass an intelligence test with an average quotient; they must have completed eight units of work by the end of their sophomore year; they must take teacher training I and II, and they must have seventy-two periods of professional training.

All pupils must pass the state teachers examination with an average of at least 80 per cent to complete this two-year course.

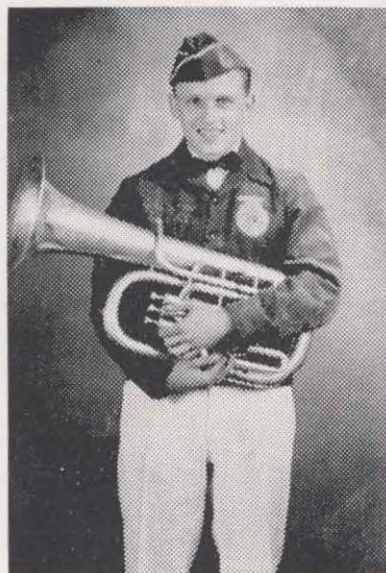
## "Down To Earth"

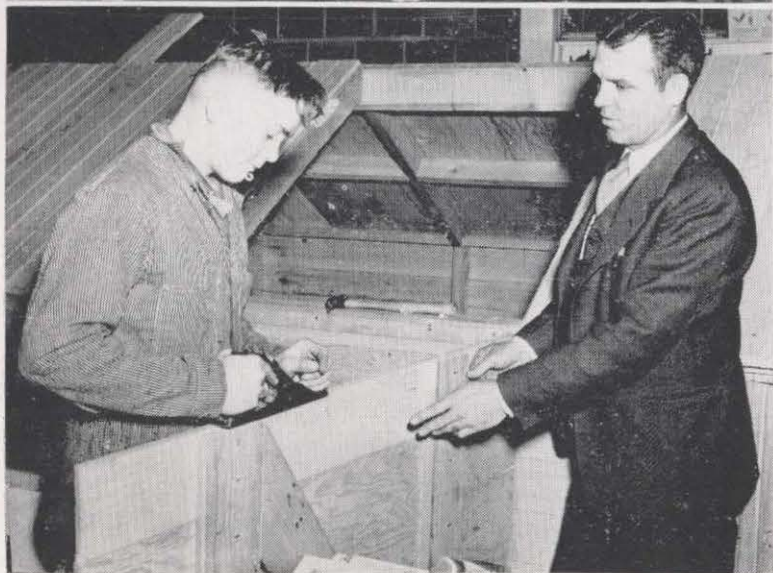

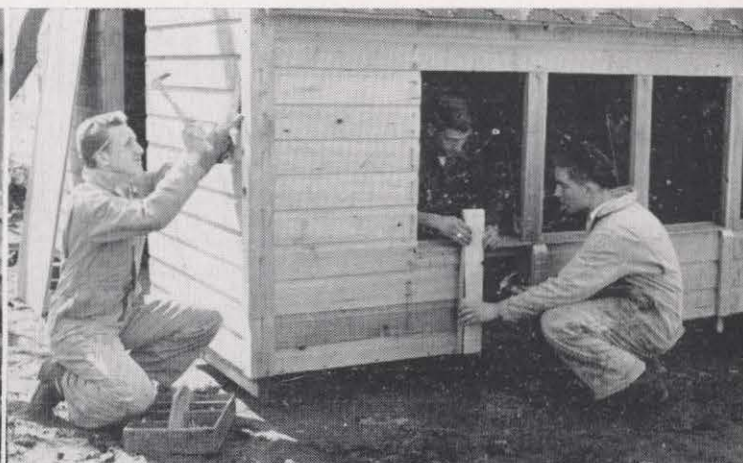

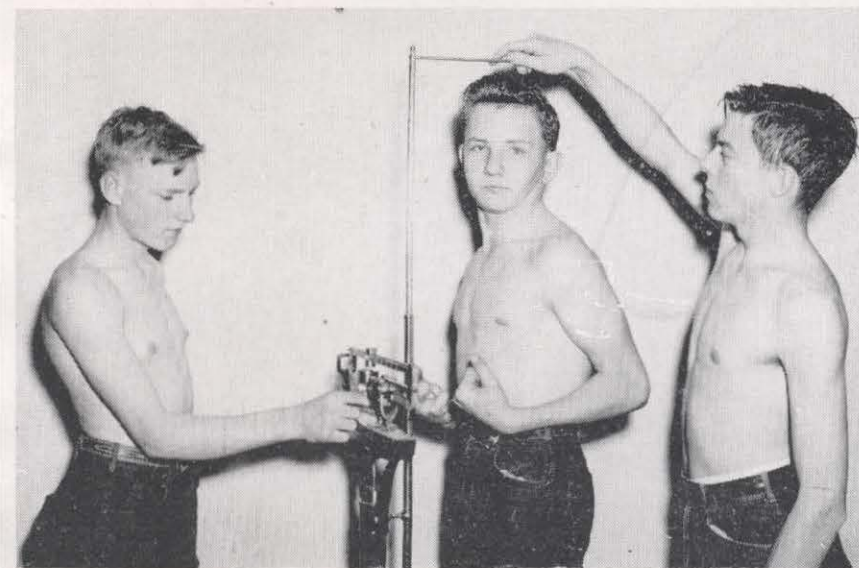

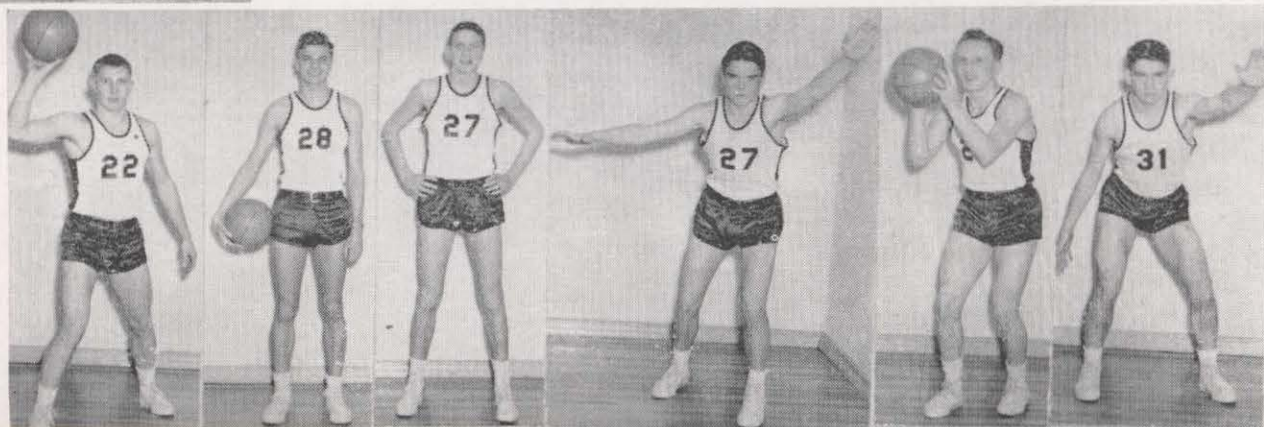

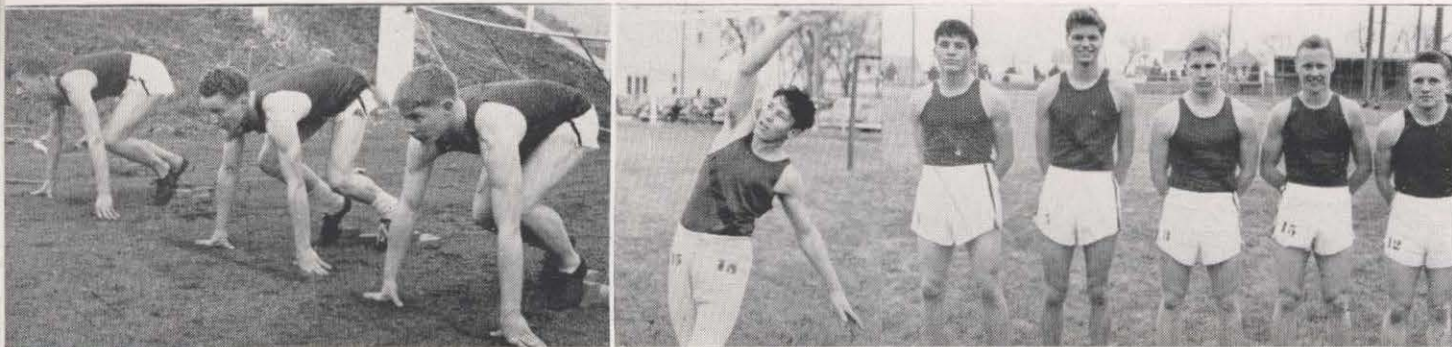

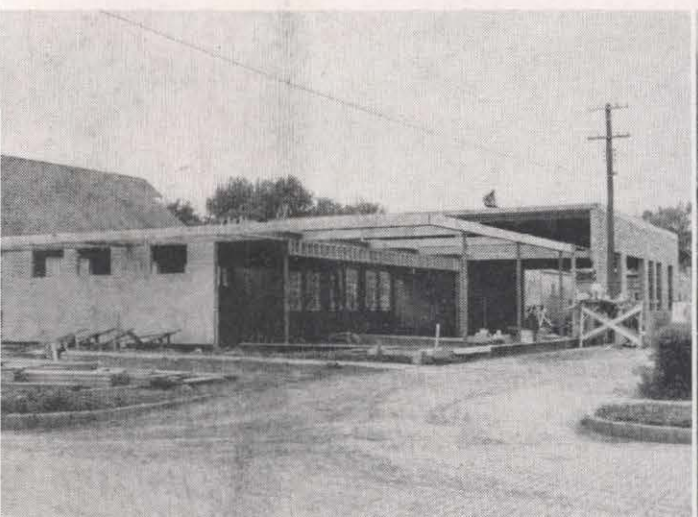
