






George Johnson was thought by many to be one of the outstanding televised programs of the year.

## LEADING CHARACTERS





"Video puerum" or "Puella est pulchra" were some of the questions asked in Mr. Raymond Traynor's program, "The Latin Hour."


Mr. Willis Moreland led many an interesting discussion in his American history and social science classes, while Mr. John Rumbaugh taught world history.

The advanced class of shop consists of ten boys while the beginner's class consists of 14.


The beginner's class learns to use hand tools, such as hand plane, hand saws and the chisel.

Rural practice teaching for this year took place during March 6-10.




The student teachers learned that teaching is more than a mere routine existence job; it is also rich in the opportunities of understanding and helping young children to learn.

They, and the other 51 vocational agriculture members, put out the Future Farmers of America annual. Pictures were taken of all the boys and their projects for the yearbook.




David City High School's "celebrity times" have been a big hit this year.





The 1949-50 Scouts became the first unde-


The victorious football team lines up for a picture.

George Abbott fights for the ball while Doyle Fyfe and Harold Grubaugh rush in to help at the Wahoo-David City game.








