For first year students there is typing and Steno I. In Steno I the students learn to take shorthand from dictation and transcribe their notes into readable letters.In Steno II they learn filing, banking and other advanced skills, and improve their typing and shorthand. The commercial courses this year were under direction of a new instructor, Miss Jeanne Woodside.

To maintain its high standing as having one of the best commercial departments in the state, DCHS must have the newest models of machines and equipment. These are available for the students taking the office machines course so that they can become efficient in operating the various types of machines that they will encounter in the business world. There is also a Steno II class and office practice course available for second year students.
