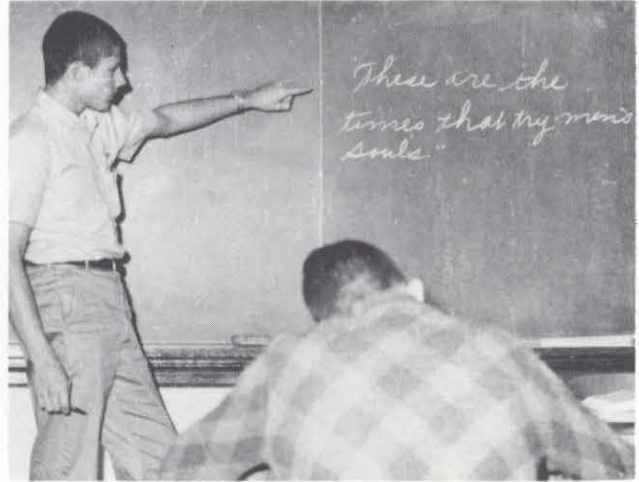
It is in our classrooms that we put in most of our precious school hours and learn the fundamentals that will guide us in future life.

Mr. Vassell spends much time with the senior English classes explaining many great works and poems so they will understand and appreciate the real arts of literature.



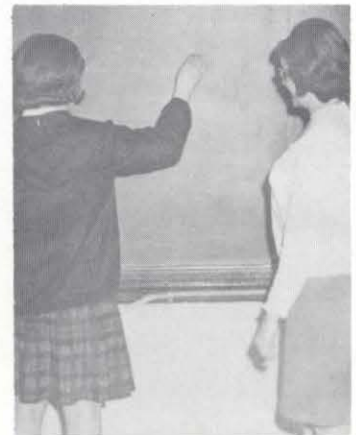
Tom Gailey has just written one of the famous lines from "The Crisis" by Thomas Paine. The English III classes study much literature and speech during the year.

The freshmen are busy working in their workbooks. They are concerned with the basic fundamentals of good English.



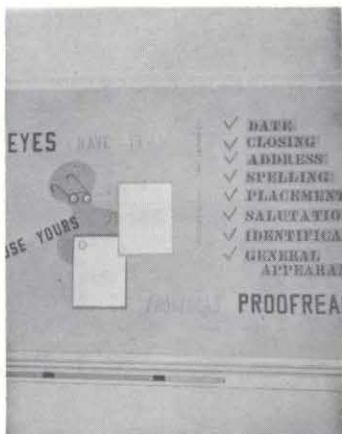

In office practice the girls work for teachers and perform the many tasks that they have for them. Here we see Bev Smith answering the phone in the office.



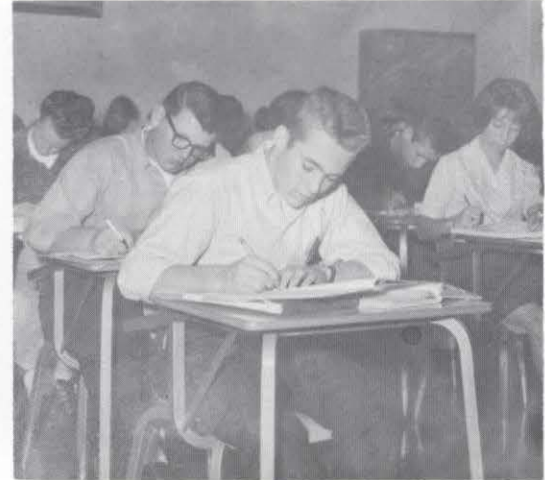

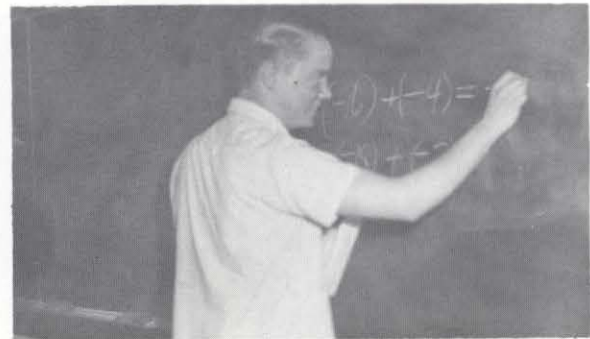
The trig class has a great deal to cover during the year. It is to prepare them for higher math which for the most of them, will be taken in college. Here we see a few of them studying?



The algebra I class appears to be concentrating on getting their next days lessons completed.



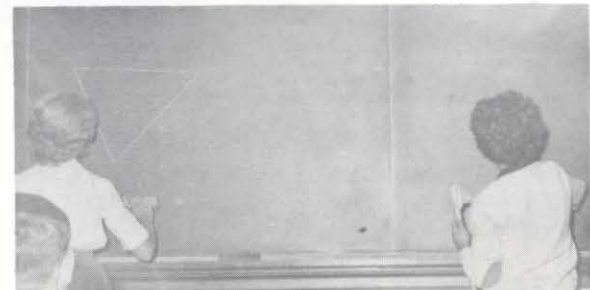
It looks as if the general math. class is trying to absorb as much knowledge as possible. Keep up the good work freshmen!

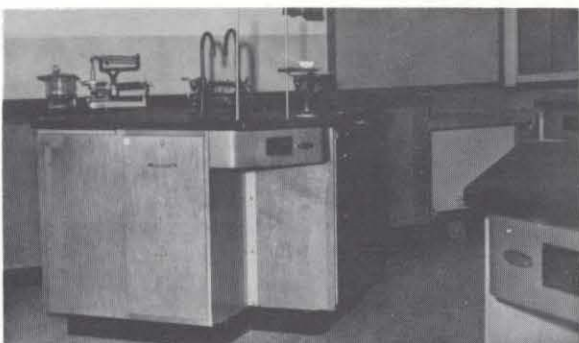

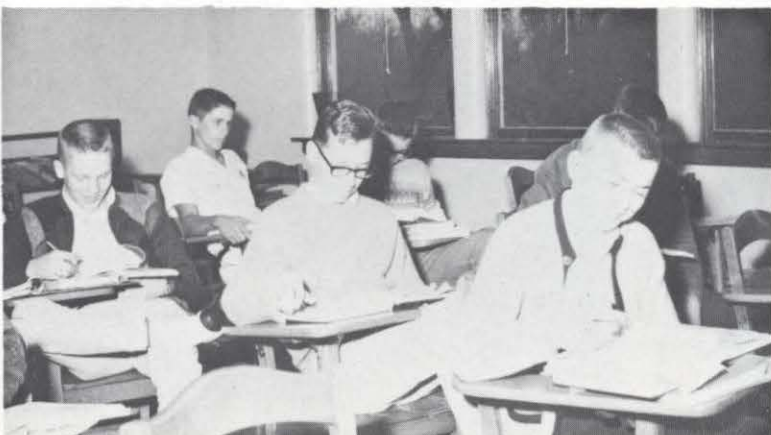

One year of science is required at DCHS to better the students' knowledge of the world around them.



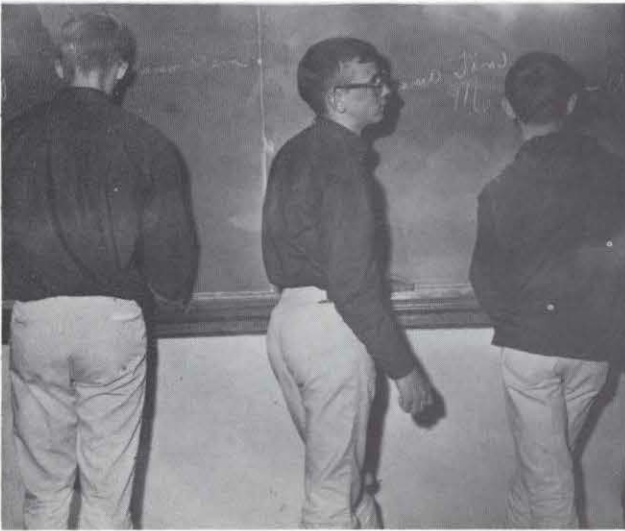

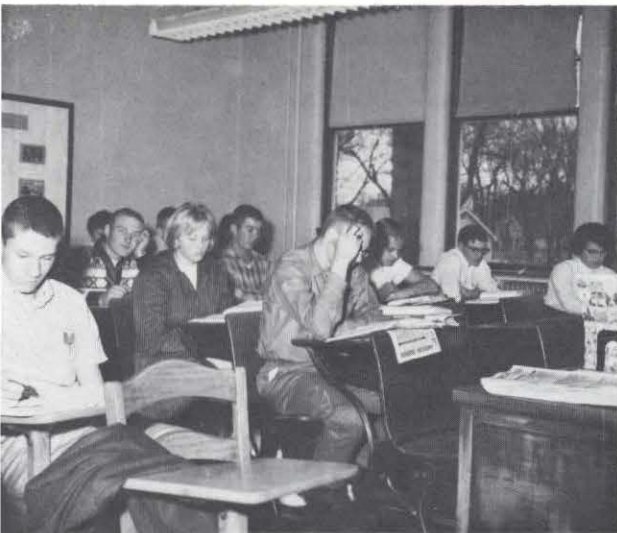

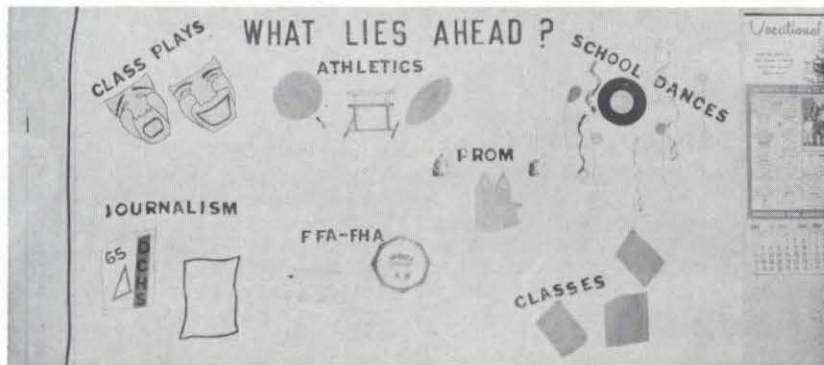
Three years of homemaking are offered to the girls at DCHS by Mrs. Williams.

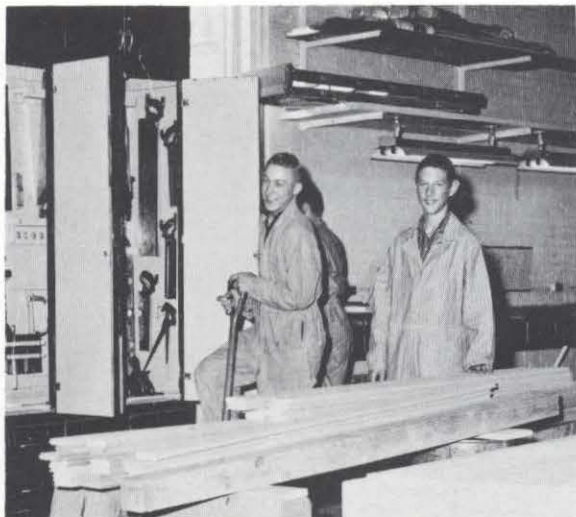

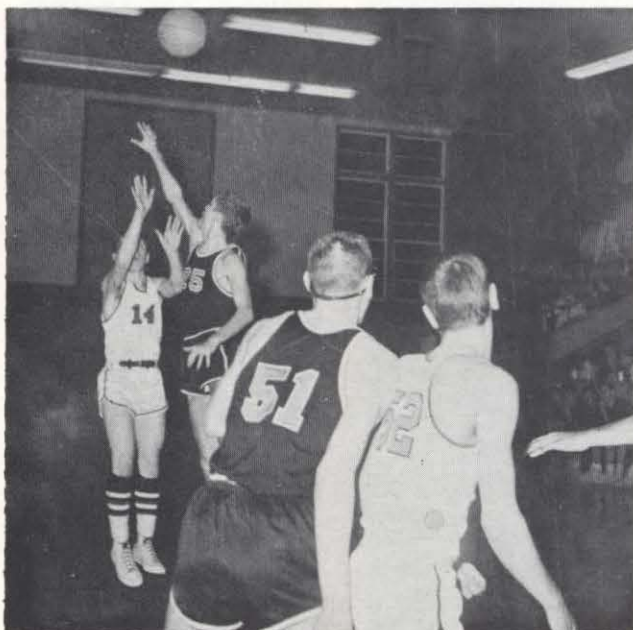
The usual starting five for the 1965 season were: Dick Ladwig, Rick Bock, Keith Slonecker, Gene Hookstra and Lanny Icenogle.

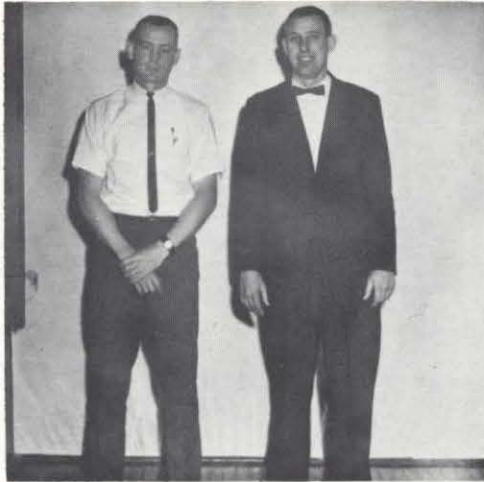

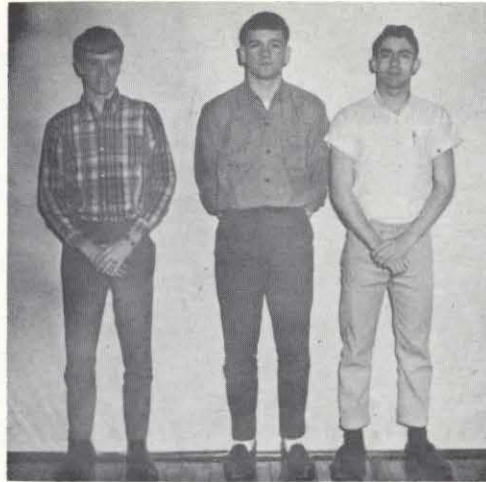

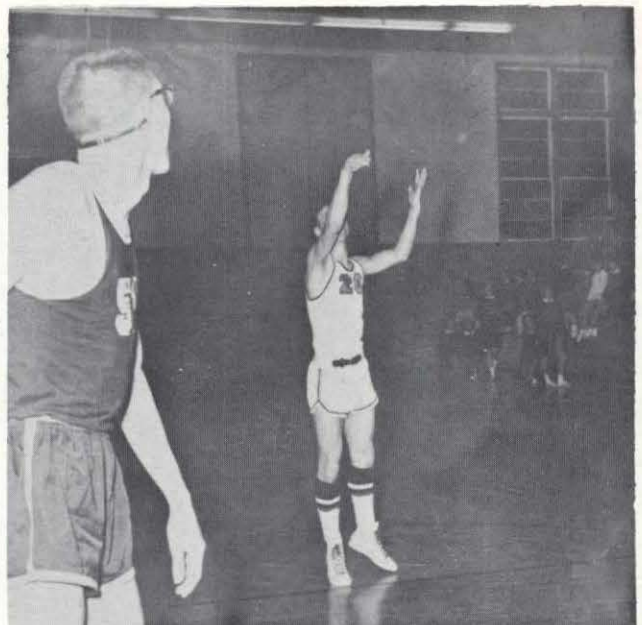

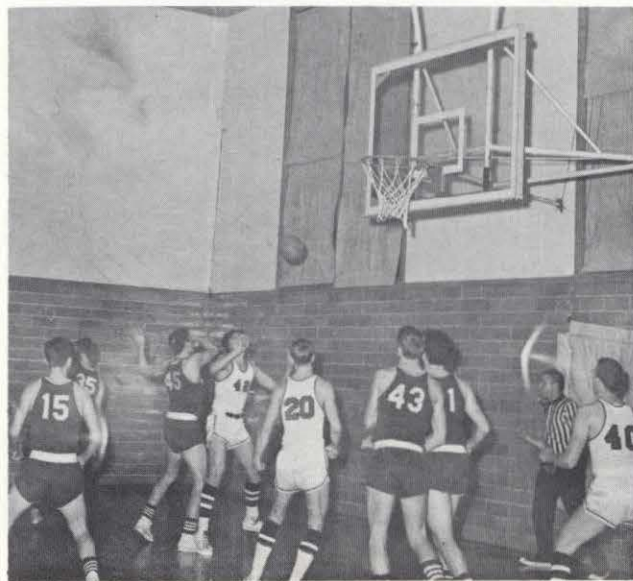

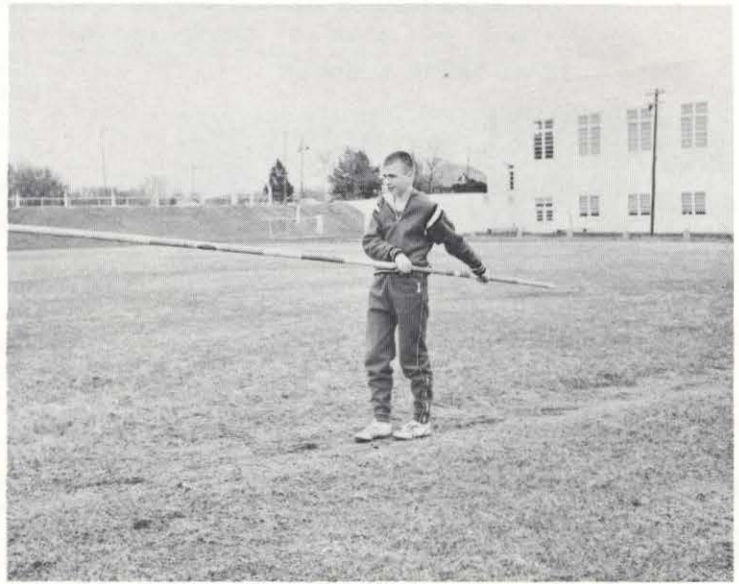

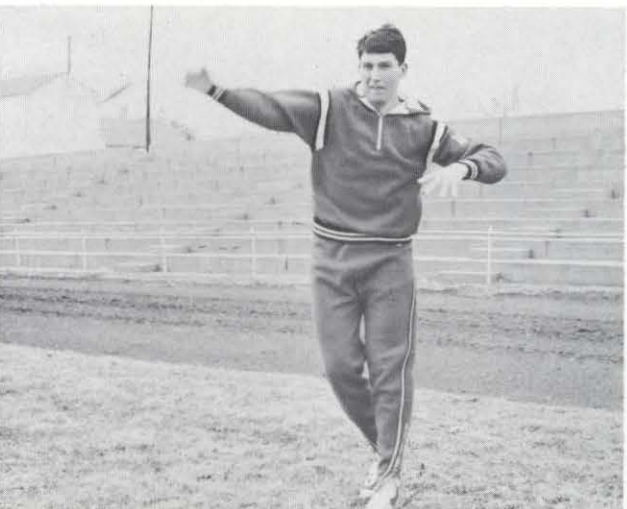

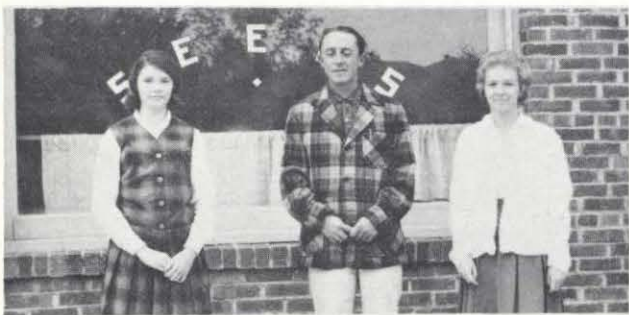

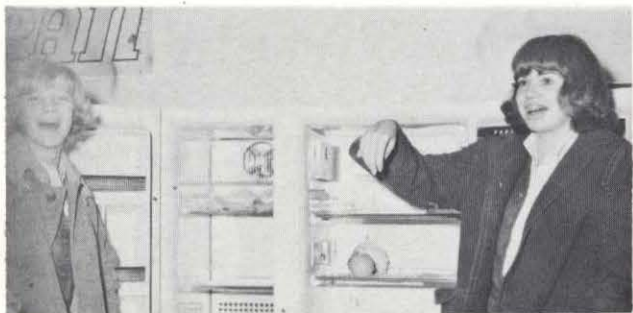

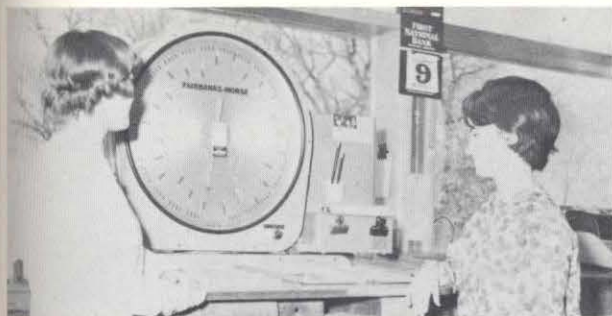

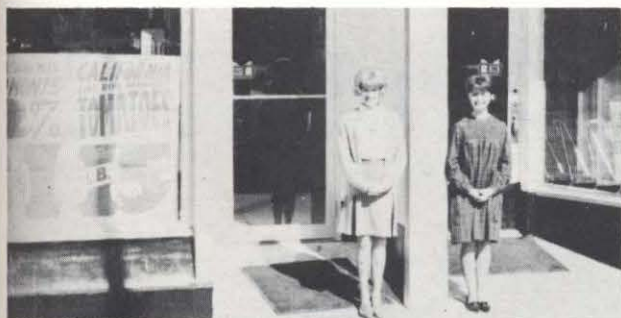
