
They who live in history, only seem to walk the earth again."

During the year the students of Mr. Penner's classes are assigned to making the bulletin boards in his room.



The biology students are concerned with the human body and animal and vegetable life of the earth. They make a thorough study of these subjects. One special project is disecting a worm and other small animals.


Mr. Boyer and Mr. Davis encourage their students to learn more about the life around them in the sciences. DCHS offers a well-rounded course in the sciences—chemistry, biology, general science, physics, and physical science, Although just one year is required for graduation, many students continue their science education with more advanced courses.

Danny Baer watches the test tubes very carefully in General Science. General Science is both a review and an introduction in the field of science. It provides a review of basic scientific principles and laws and an introduction into the higher forms of science.



Physical science contains a great deal of terminology and provides a basis for physics. The students learn about fundamental theories and laws.



Physics, taught by Mr. Davis, is a fascinating study of mathematics put to common and not so common uses. Electricity, among other things, is part of the studies.

Mr. Vassell often hears many interesting and often amusing things during his English classes. This is what makes English so enjoyable to teach.

To have an idea and not to be able to express it clearly is just as bad as never having an idea at all. The English department of David City High School strives to give an adequate and complete knowledge in all phases of English to its students. Many times the students are given the opportunity to do creative writing both of short stories and poetry which are given critical consideration by the teachers. English is the basis of a well rounded life.



English IV dwells a great deal on literature and its place in the humanities. Drama is included in this literature, from that of Shakespeare to Shaw, each having its own meaningful purpose. Creative writing is especially encouraged by Mr. Vassell.



Educational television provides an outlook on English beyond the classroom. Note-taking is essential and gives the students practice in this useful art that they will need in college.






The math section of our high school is one of the most important divisions of our school life. It gives us a good background for our later life and even college.

"Experience teaches."





The students of DCHS have the fine opportunity to take two years of Spanish during their high school years. Many schools don't offer any foreign language courses in their school program. But DCHS has realized the need to know a foreign language. It especially helps to have at least one or two years of a foreign language before you enter college. The art of drawing is taught at DCHS by Mr. John Faiman. In the mechanical drawing, the senior boys learn the basics of constructing and drawing various lines.

In Industrial Arts I and II the boys learn to use various hand and electric tools. With these tools, they acquire great skill in woodworking and become able to make furniture and other articles for their own use.




The boys in Vocational Agriculture I learn the basics in farming and machinery. Here are two boys working with one of the pieces of electrical equipment.



Boys in Ag. III further their knowledge and work with various fundamentals in connection with the farm. Here Pat Adamy and John Haney experiment with welding two steel pipes.




The Ag. I boys spend a good deal of time in the classrooms. Here the boys are busily studying a chapter on Farm Management.



Many students use the library of DCHS for finding facts and information for their various school work and assignments. Our library is equipped with the latest reference books and magazines available.



There are a certain amount of classroom hours that are required to fill the Drivers Training requirements. Here the pupils are studying the laws of safe driving in the state of Nebraska.












