



We are aroused out of our dormancy by an increasing resurgence of awareness, like the winter wheat is tickled alive by the spring.



We have survived four years of a maturing process. It shows in our faces. We came full of enthusiasm living for the present. We leave with quiet determination and four years of experience behind us.




Mr. Chaney's Monday morning assemblies, Ag I field trips, the first complicated biology lab, history plays for the Sophs, break in to the monotony.




You tried to sit still but the class seemed to drag on and on. You'd fidget and squirm and eye the clock urging it to go faster.



"David City Public Schools" says a cheery voice. It probably belongs to Cindy Zeilinger, who is taking Office Practice for the experience.











Action shots here show Mel Aldrich running over York, as the Big Red powerhouse proves too much for the Dukes, in season opener.








