



- 1. You will not marry during the term of your contract.
- 2. You are not to keep company with men.
- You must be home between the hours of 8 P.M. and 6 A.M. unless attending a school function.
- 4. You may not loiter downtown in ice cream stores.
- You may not travel beyond the city limits, unless you have permission of the chairman of the board.
- You may not ride in a carriage or automobile with any man, unless he is your father or brother.
- 7. You may not smoke cigarettes.
- 8. You may not dress in bright colors.
- 9. You may under circumstances dye your hair.
- 10. You must wear at least two petticoats.
- Your dresses must not be any shorter than two inches above the ankle.
- 12. To keep the school room neat and clean, you must: sweep the floor at least once daily; scrub the floor at least once a week with hot soapy water; clean the blackboards at least once a day; and start the fire at 7 A.M. so the room will be warm by 8 A.M.

This years experience for all the girls in winning, losing, and general playing only increases enthusiastic optimism for next year.








