












Finish Research





"It has been a good experience for me so far and I hope we will do well at Nationals," sophomore Brad Carlson said.



























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



































Senior Cherette Mastry headed to the state competition for refurth year in a row. At state, Mastry managed to capture






f "I'm confident about going to state. I think as a team will do really well and place in the top 10," junior Auson Behrns said.

On prom night, Pat Behrns, head football coach of the UNO Mavericks, spoke to the juniors and seniors about the importance of good decision making.


"The speaker was interesting. Though many people didn't pay attention or show him the respect that he deserved, he was still an excellent speaker," senior Ashley Bell said.
