













Abby Bathen said, "It was a challenge at first, but I learned how to deal with the pressure of being the varsity setter."


They also had a lot of experience from last year, returning four starters who all contributed to their success this year and previous years.







One Act Makes the Trip to State










"Lights... Camera... Action?" are some words you might hear when the journalism students go around school snapping that picture perfect scene that could make or break your newspaper or yearbook.






There are also some new projects going on in the art room this year such as pottery, screamers, and an egg drop. Mrs. Detmer tries to have new ideas for each area every year.






Un The Road To Improvements

"We learned a lot about ourselves and about each team member. We gained a lot of experience which will benefit us next year," junior Katie Kabourek said.


The team felt like they gained a lot of respect by never giving up and going out every game and giving it their all. Yet, the players felt the effect that a lack of crowd support has on the team.










































MSN Messenger

Question #1: How many hours a night do you use the MSN Messenger?(45 students polled)




Question #2: How many people do you talk to an average each night?(45 students polled)














The End of the Road


