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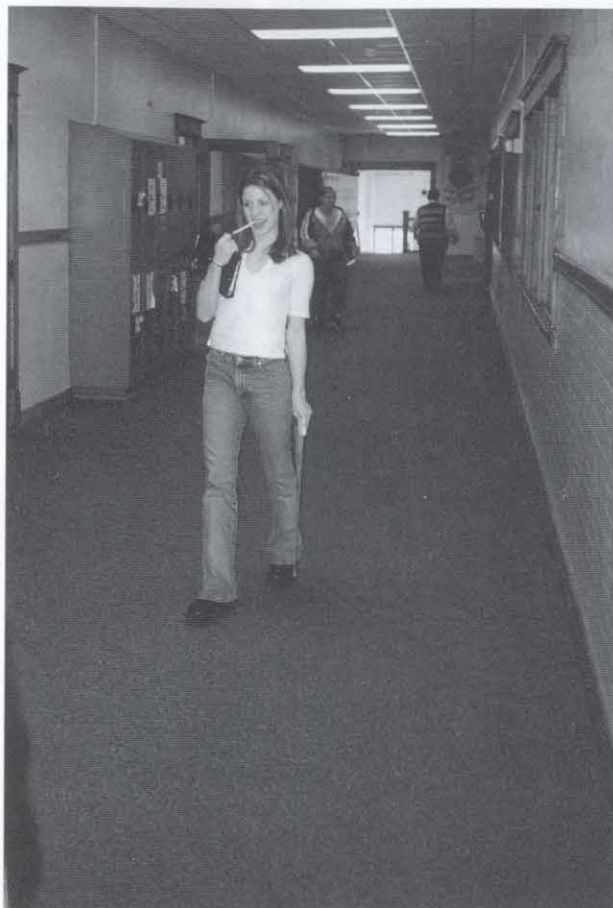

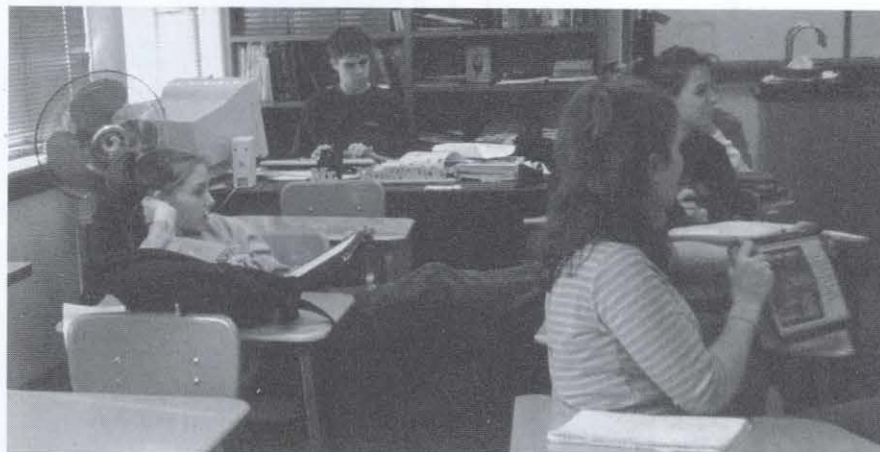

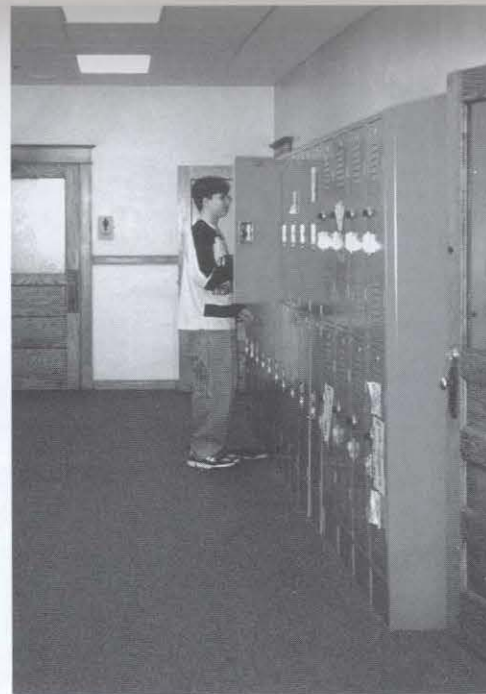

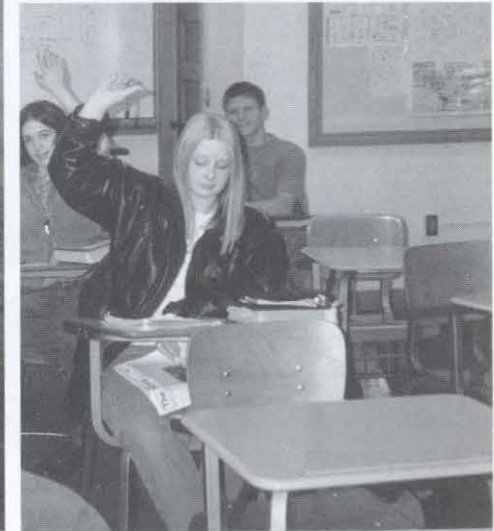

"We were looking forward to having weights Monday through Thursday, and Friday being a fun day where we could let loose and have a ball" sophomore Paige Robinson said.

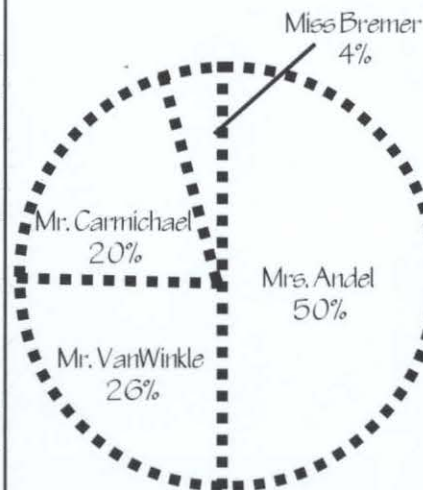
Now, instead of this fun day, weight classes have an Anatomy class every Friday.

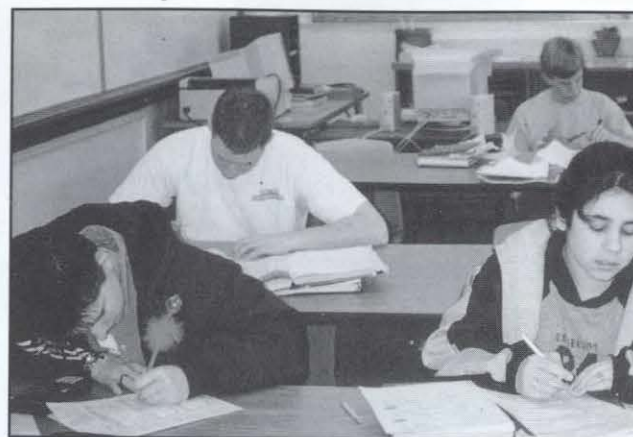
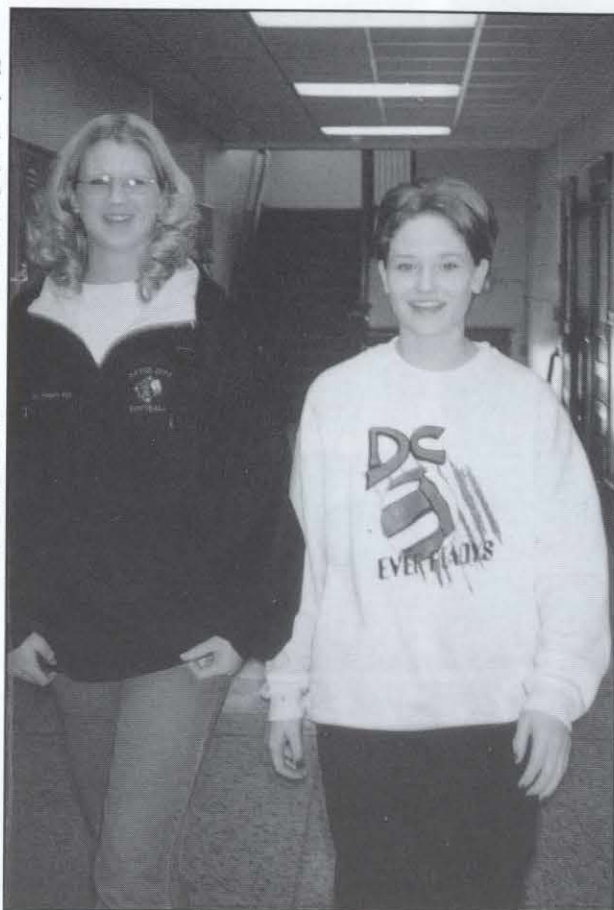

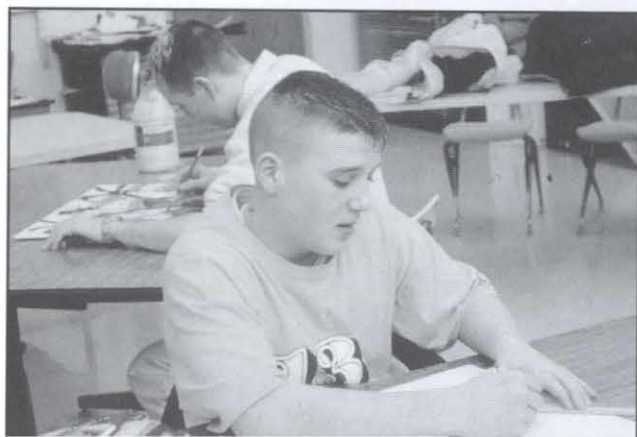

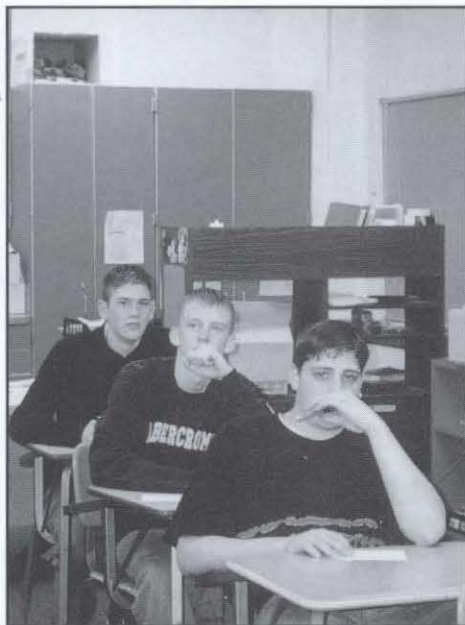

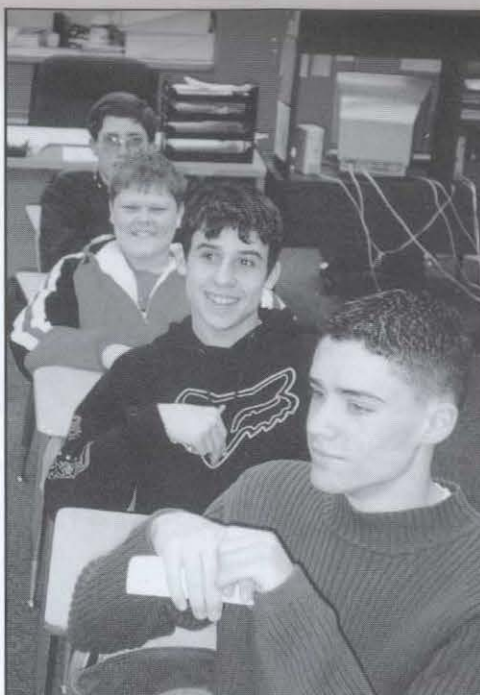

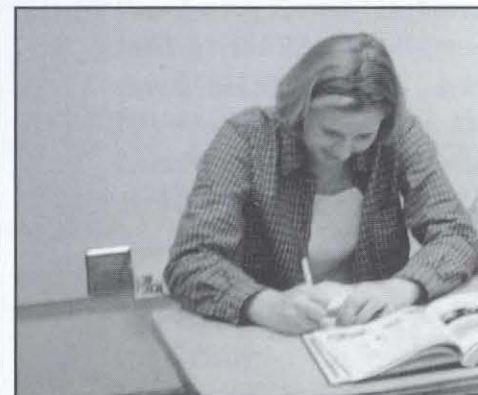

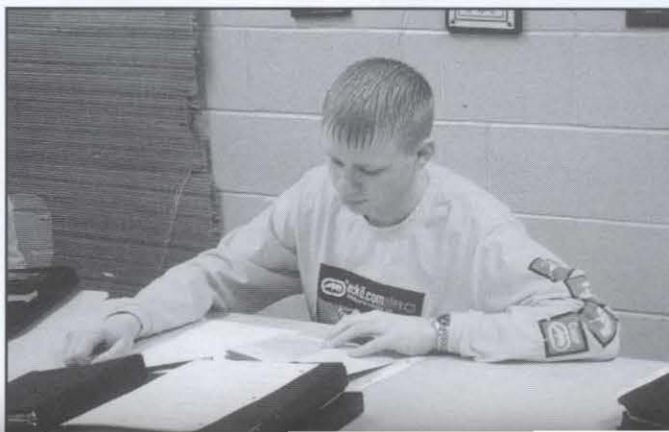

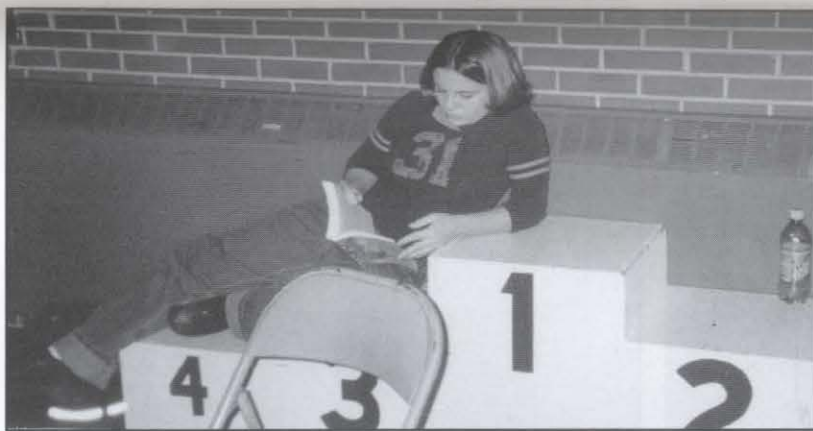

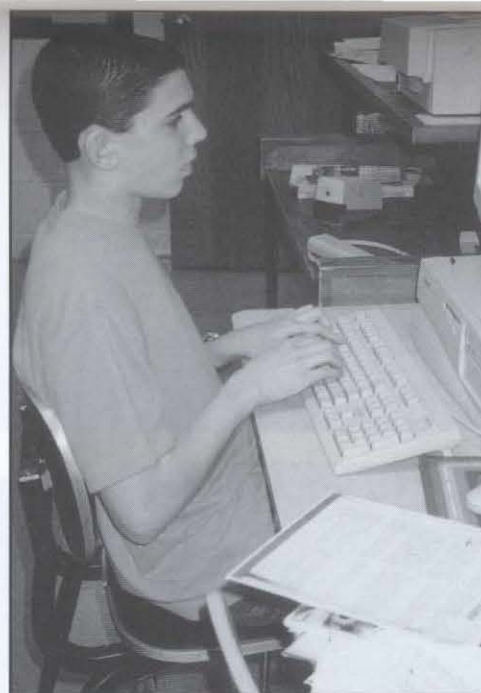

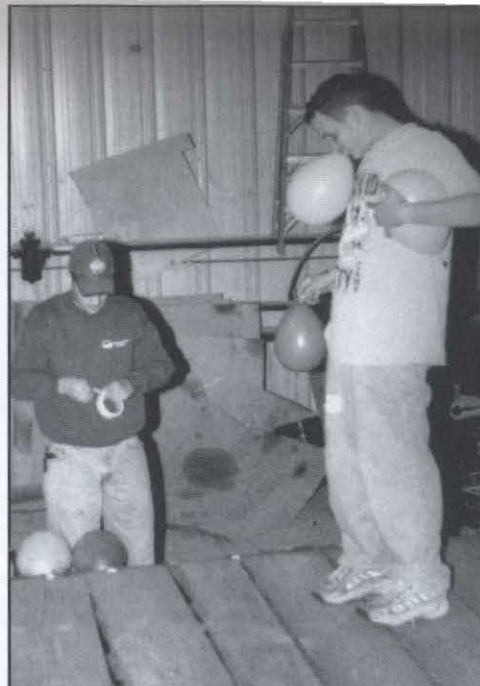

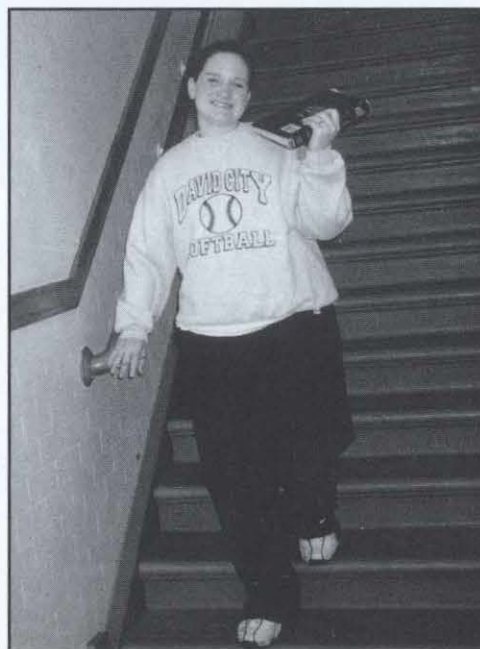

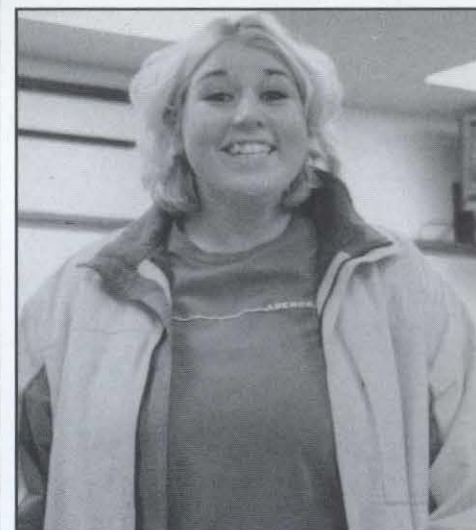

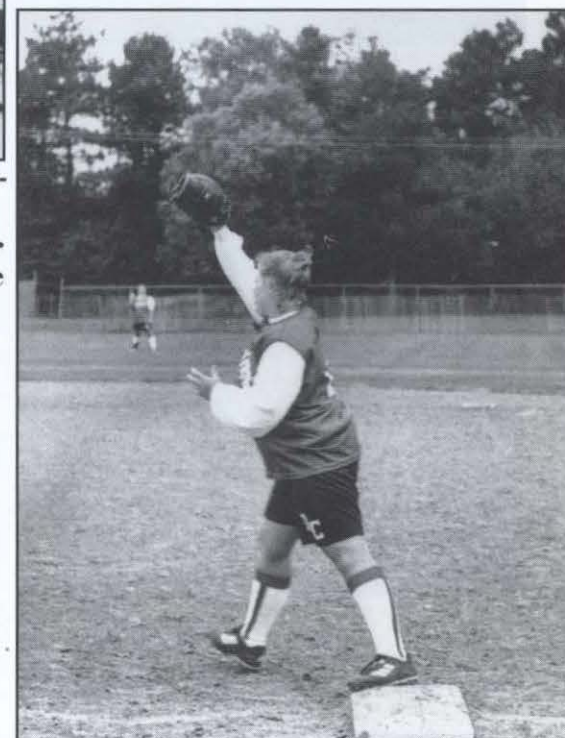

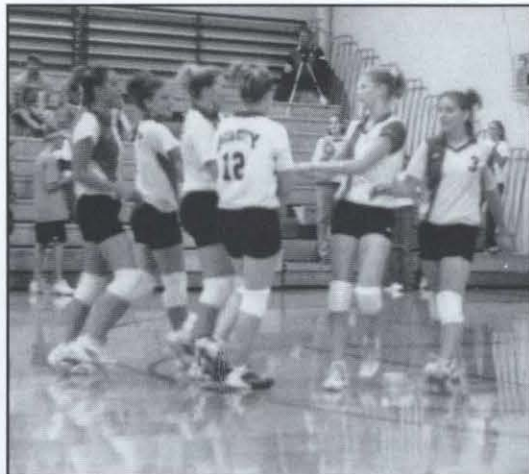

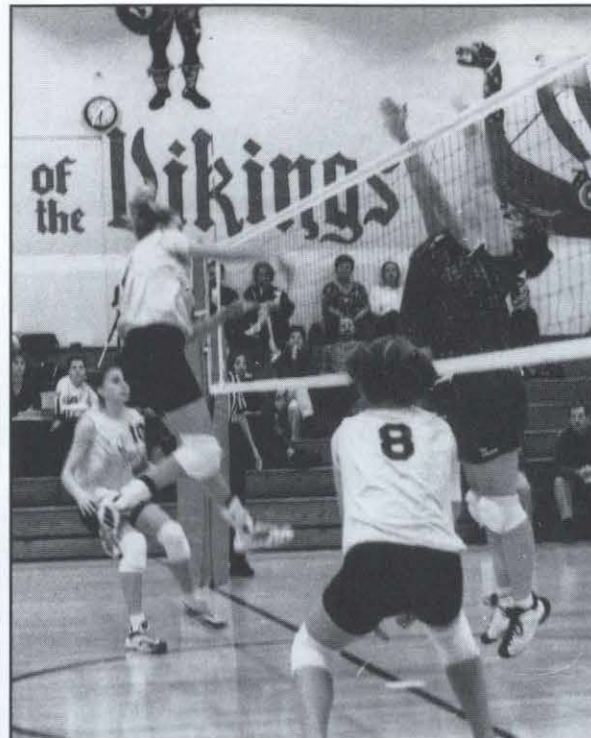

Abby Bathen said, "It was a challenge at first, but I learned how to deal with the pressure of being the varsity setter."

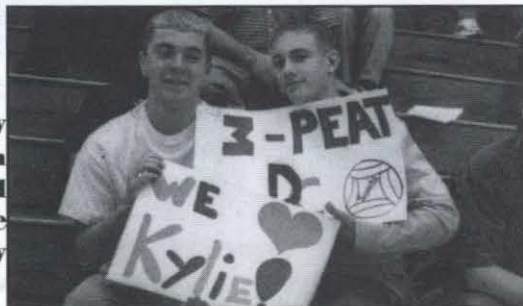
They also had a lot of experience from last year, returning four starters who all contributed to their success this year and previous years.

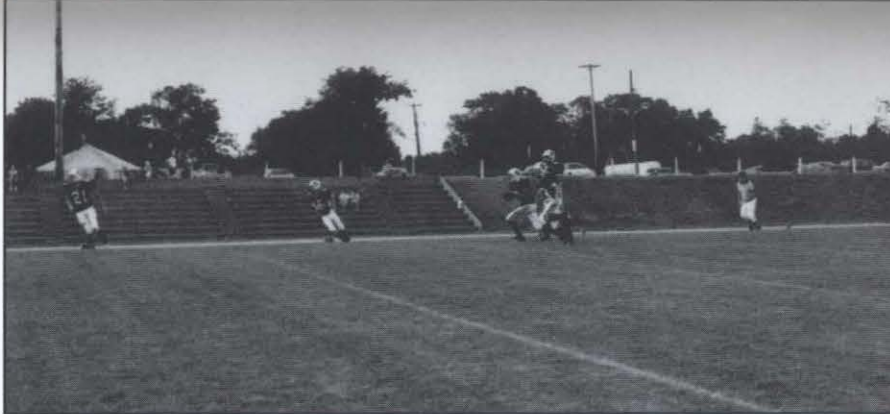

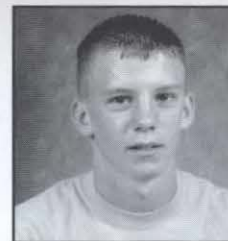


Above: Trying to score with an ace serve for the Scout volleyball team is freshman Sam Hopwood. Serving became a strong point for all levels of play.

Sophomore Tracy Romshek said "As the time went on we began to see some improvement and have always had tough competitions from the beginning."

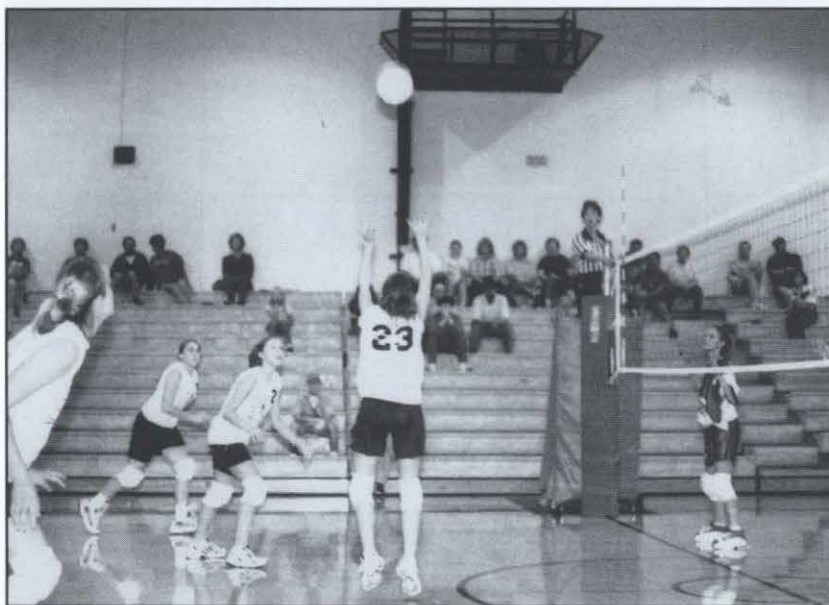

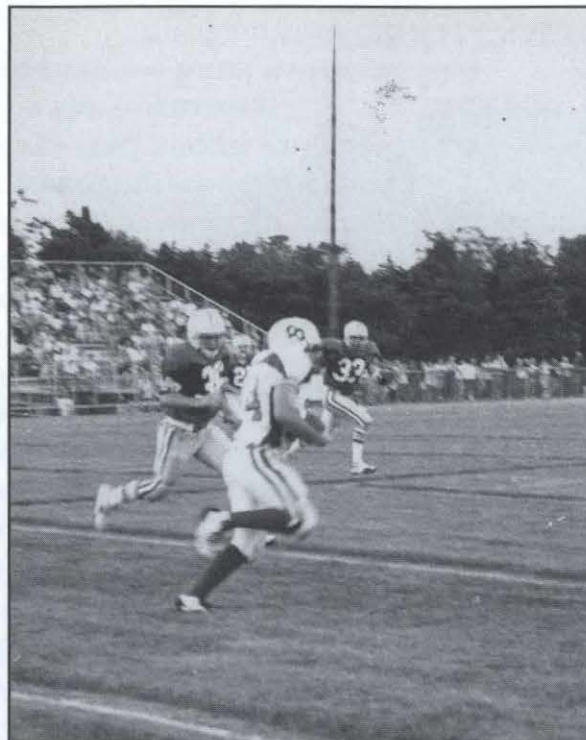

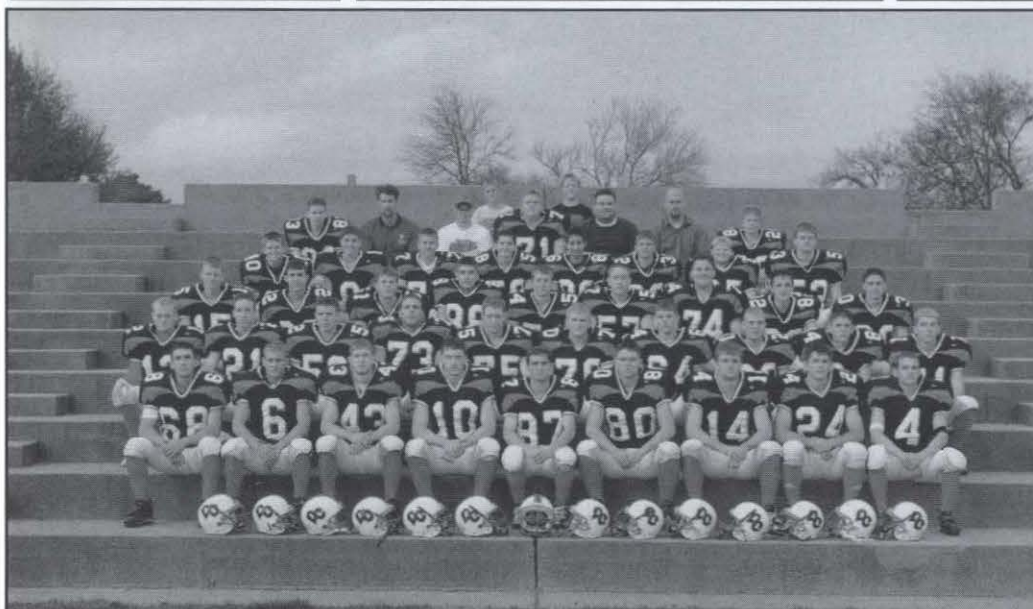

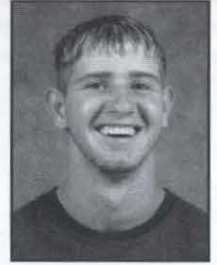

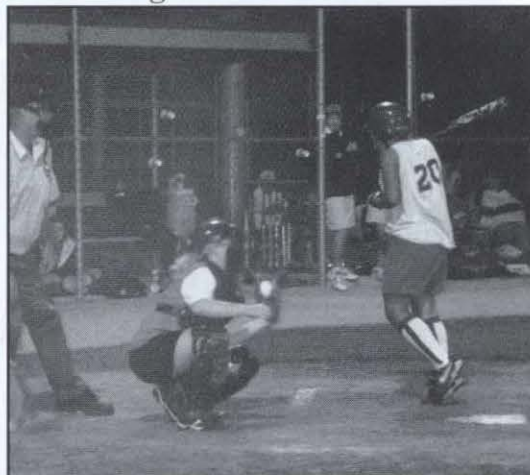

"I was able to play more than I thought I would because I got to play in JV and once in a while I would get to play on varsity," freshman Alyssa Romshek added.

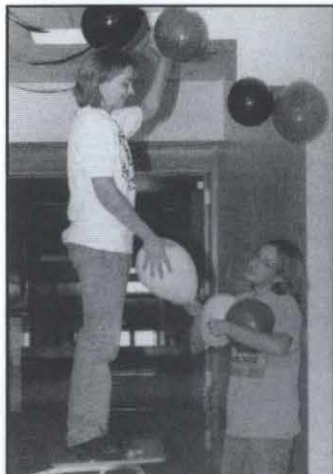
All in all the team improved a lot in the past two years and even set new school records. The team looks to keep improving in the years to come, but a down fall to the team is losing seven seniors.

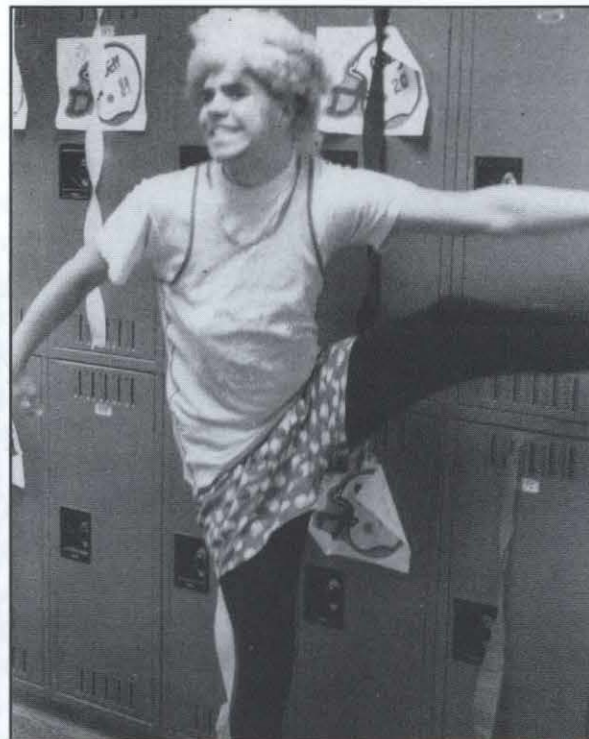

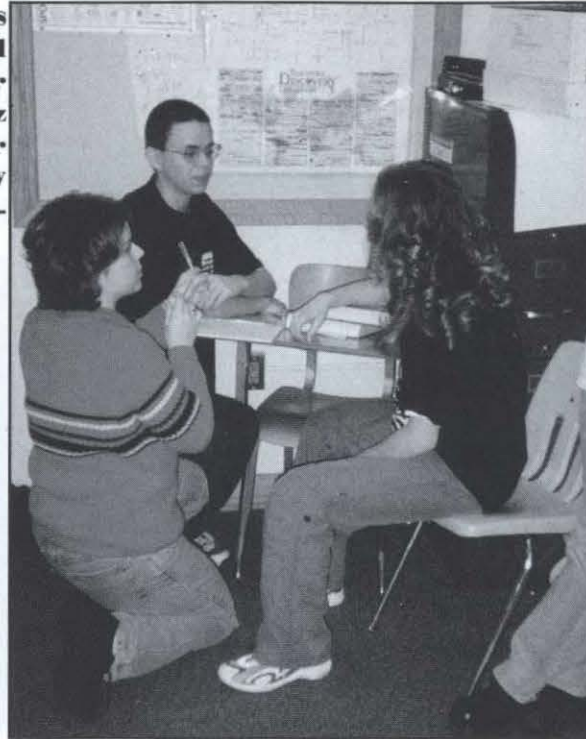

The team has a lot to look forward to next year. One of their goals will most definitely be to beat Wahoo and continue their journey to state.



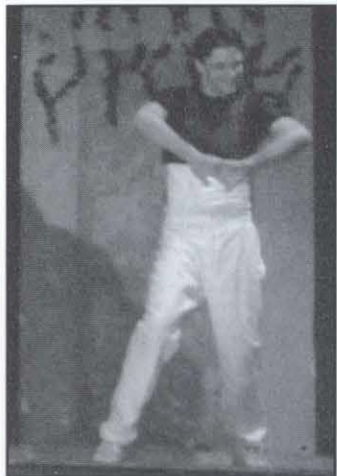

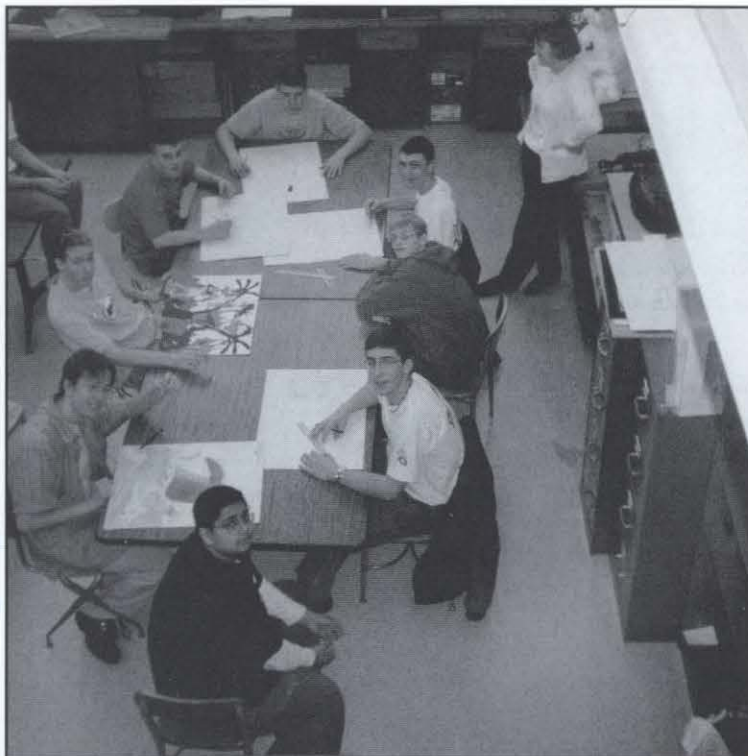

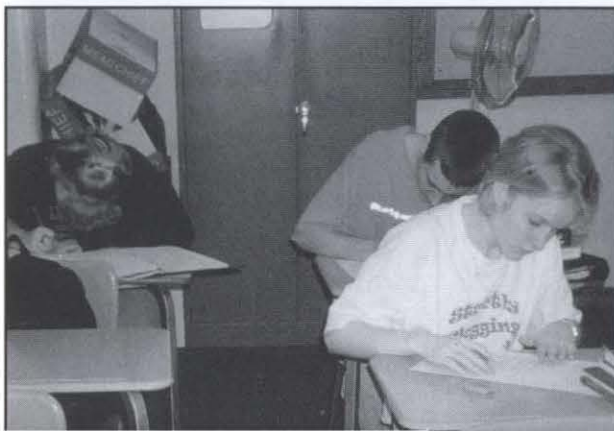

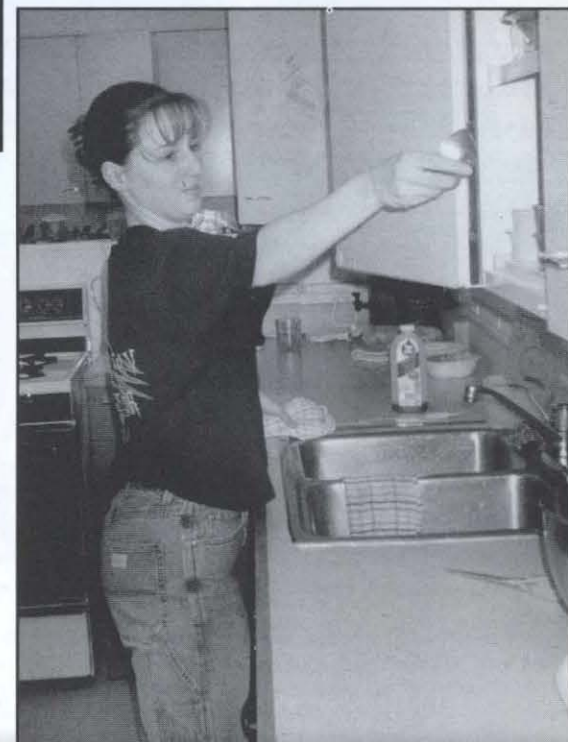

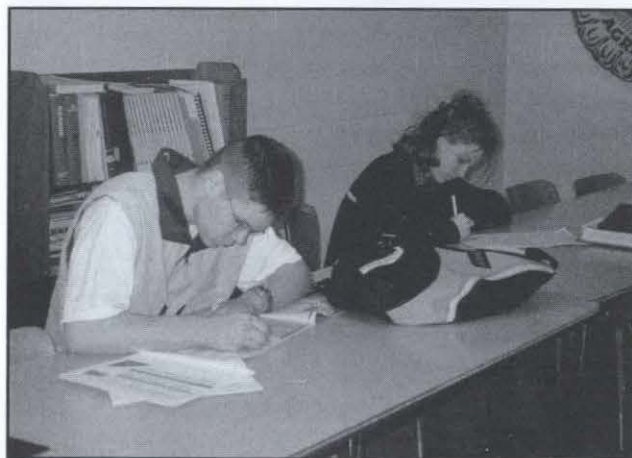

As part of the adjustments being made from last year, seventh hour access period was removed. This

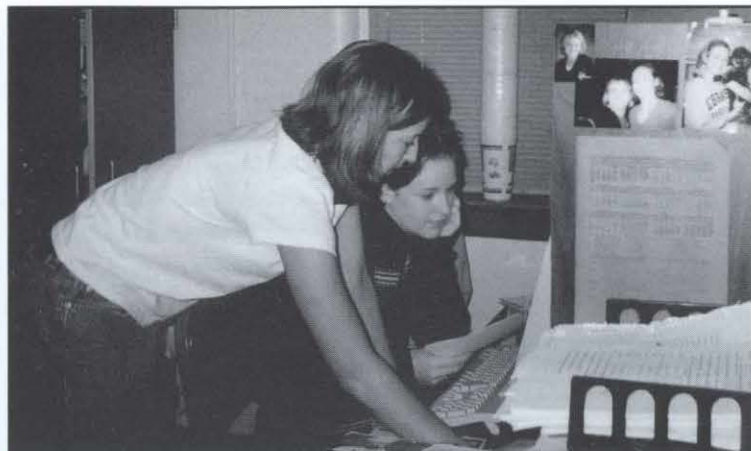

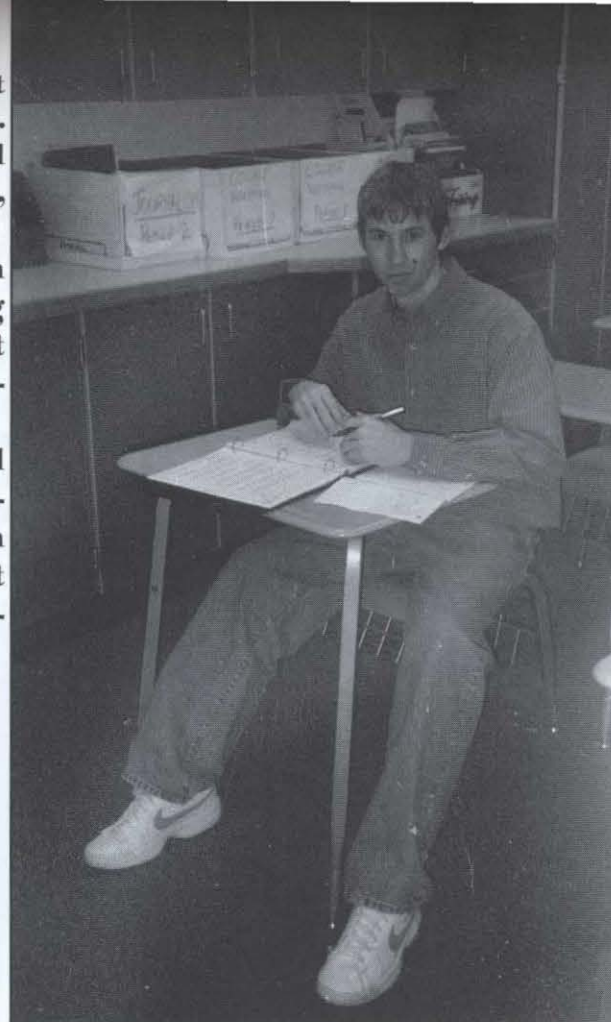
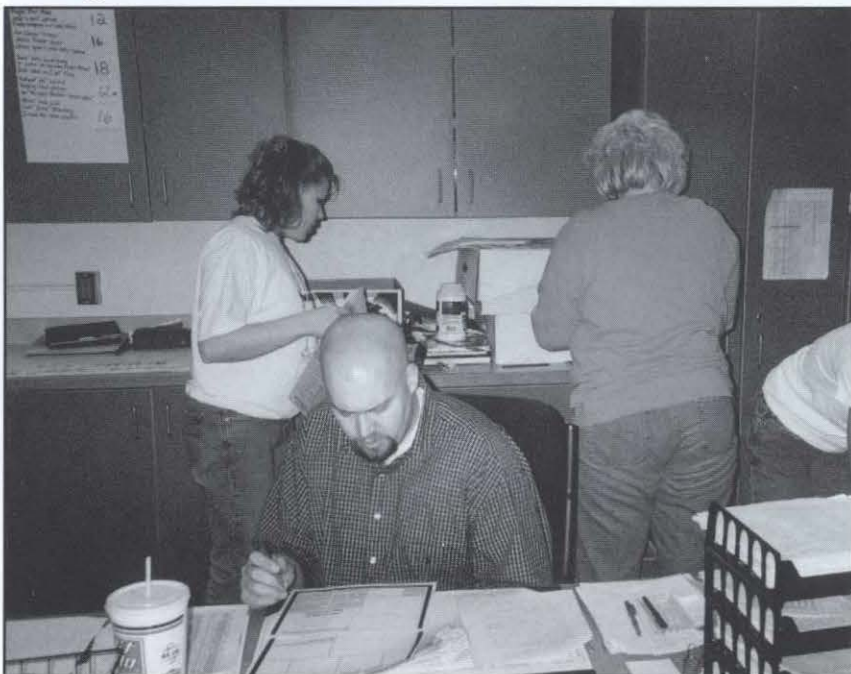
This year the yearbook staff is taking a different approach with the layout.

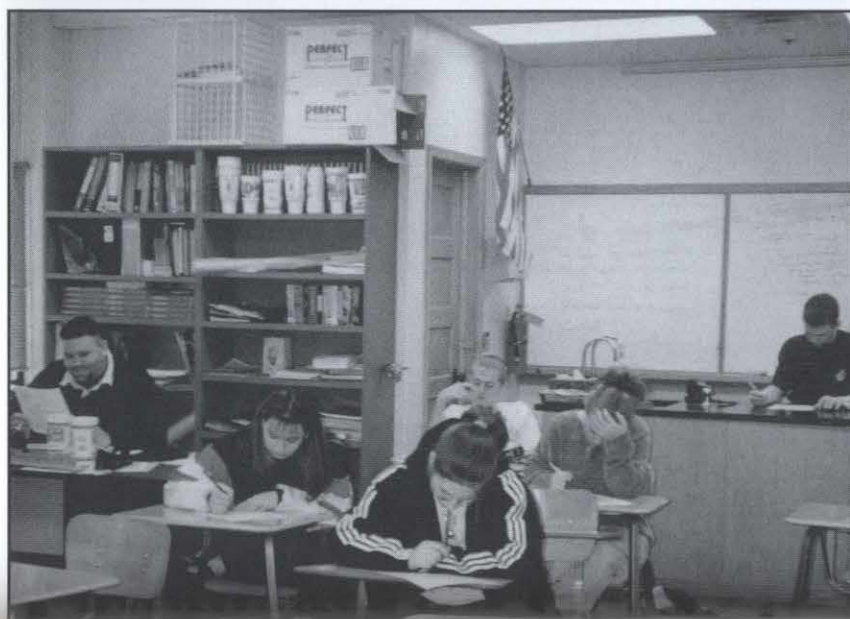

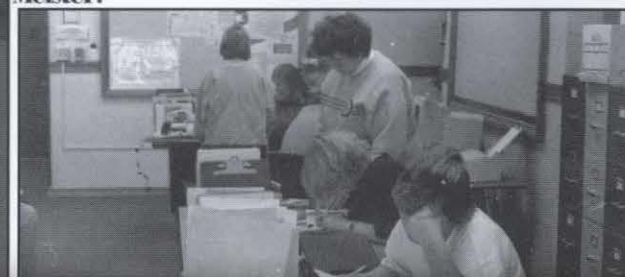

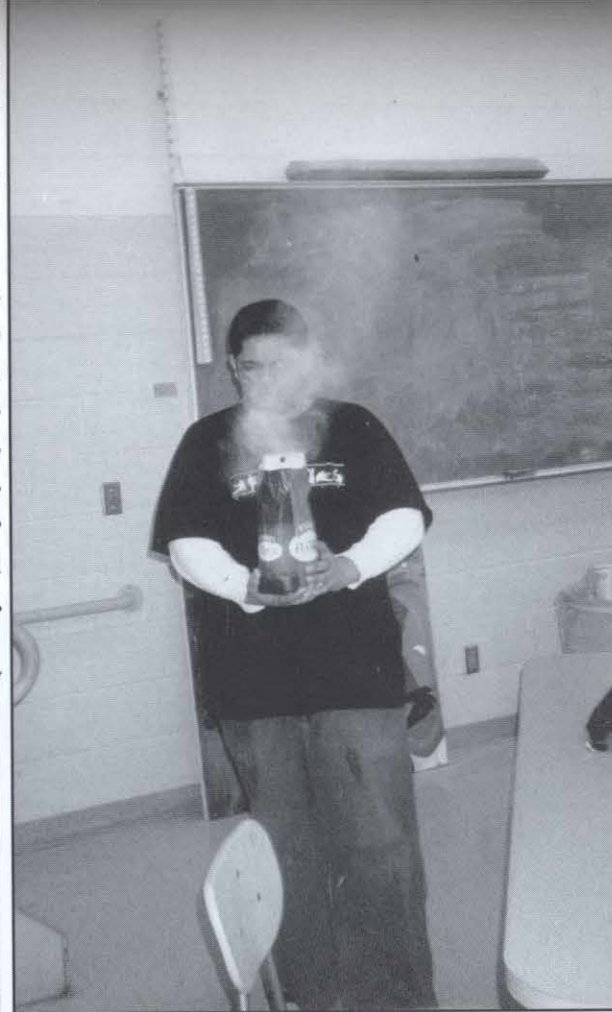
There are also some new projects going on in the art room this year such as pottery, screamers, and an egg drop.

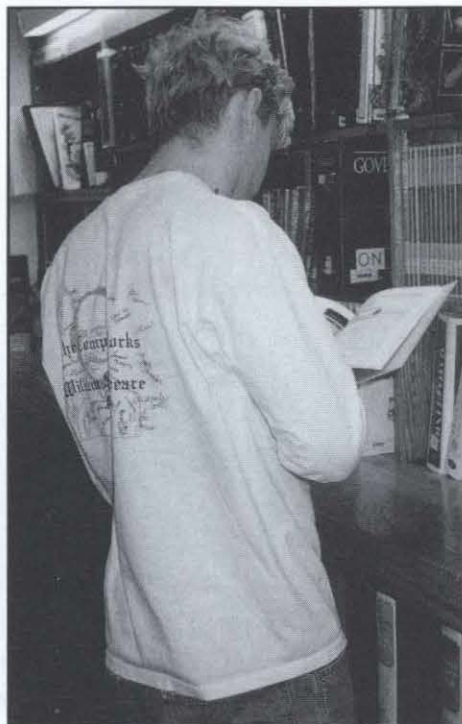

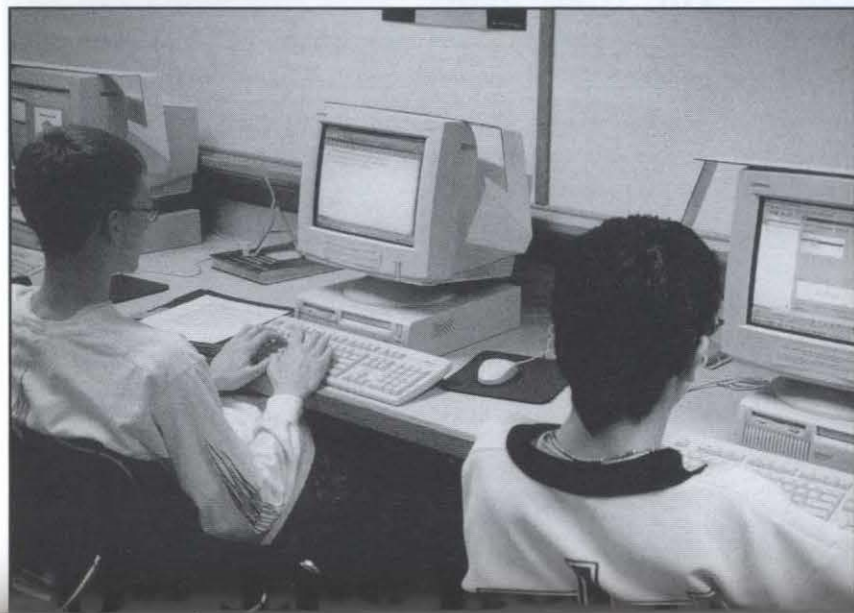

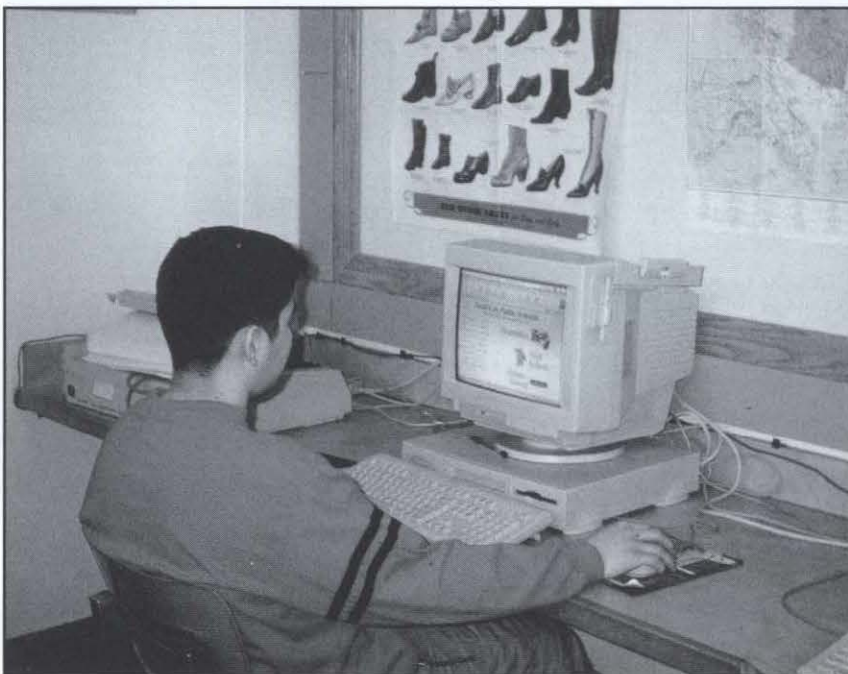
On The Road To Improvements

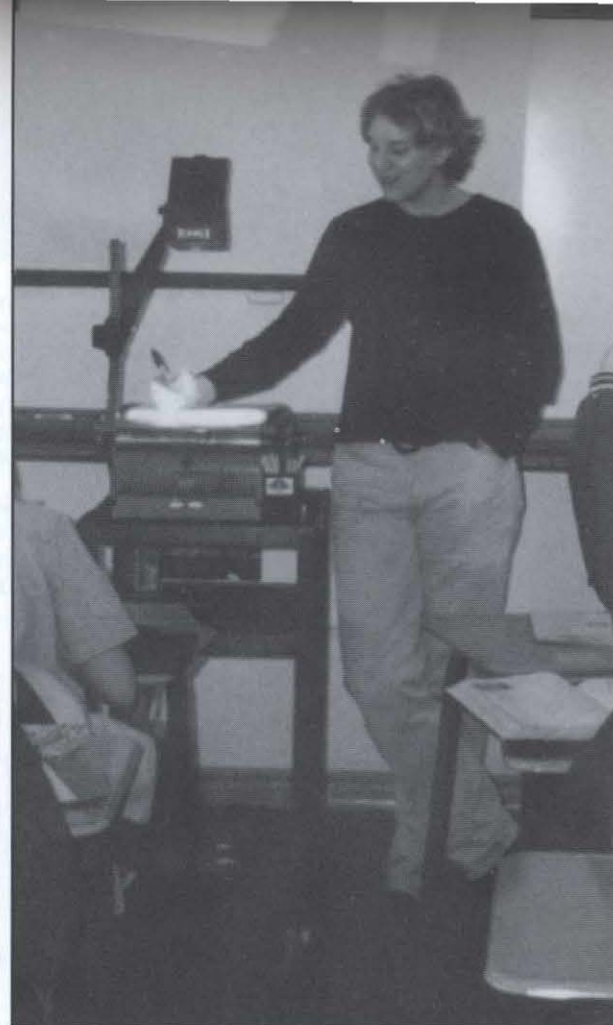
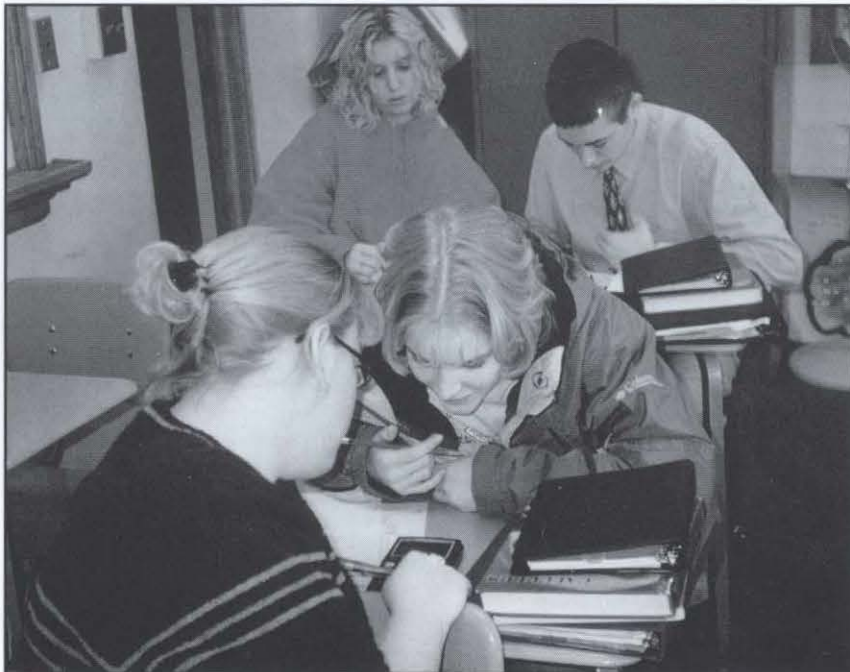
Take A Journey Through The Mind

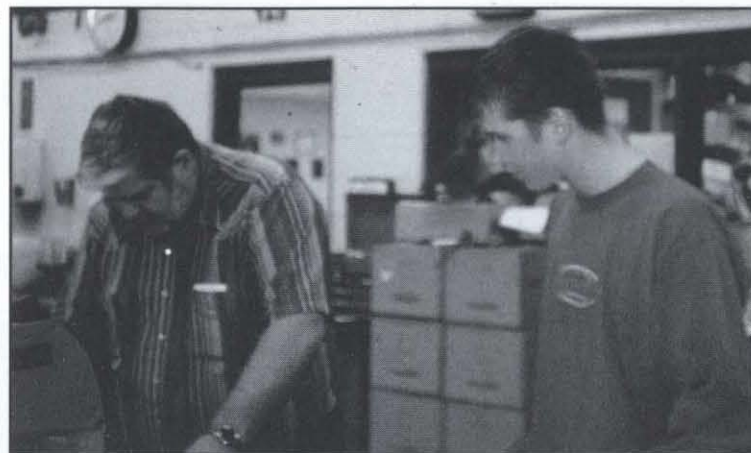

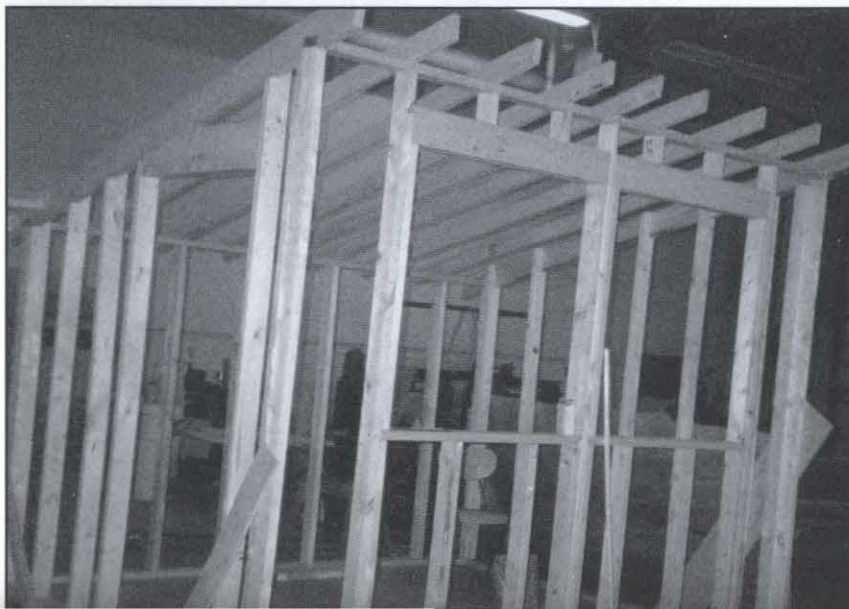

Ag Swims to New Lengths

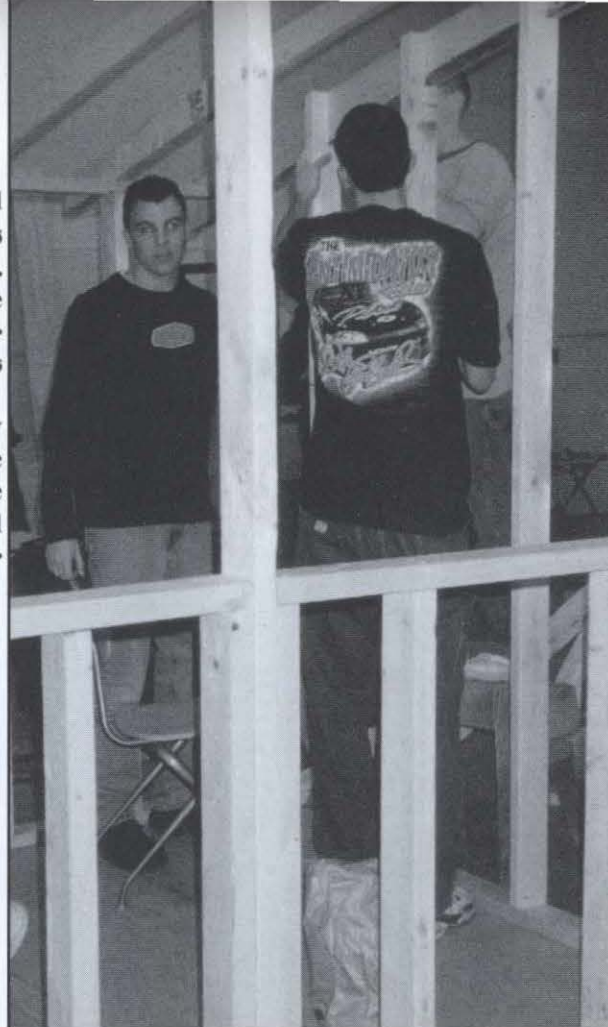

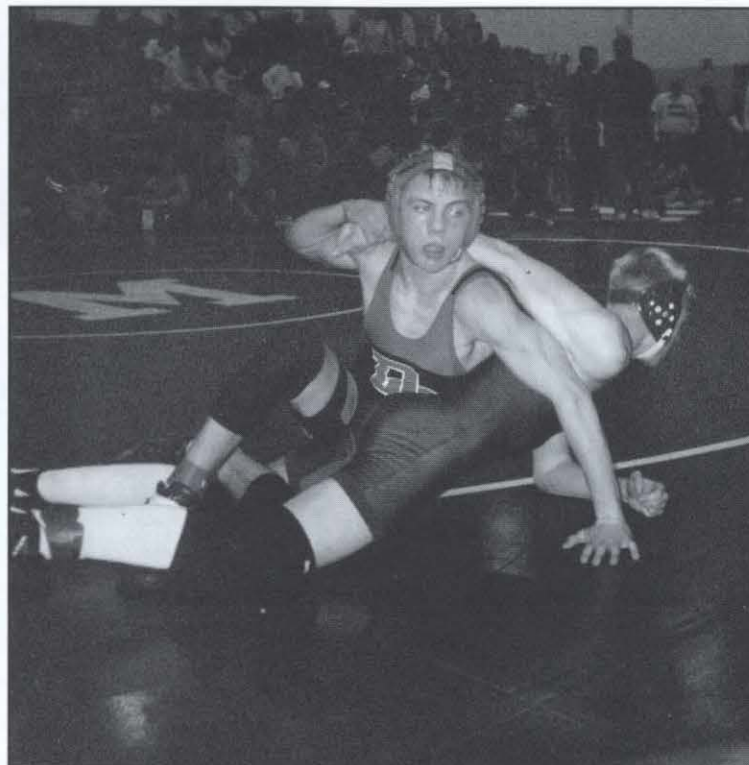

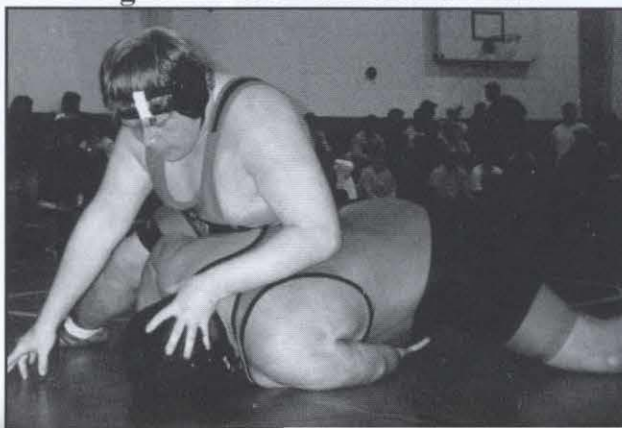

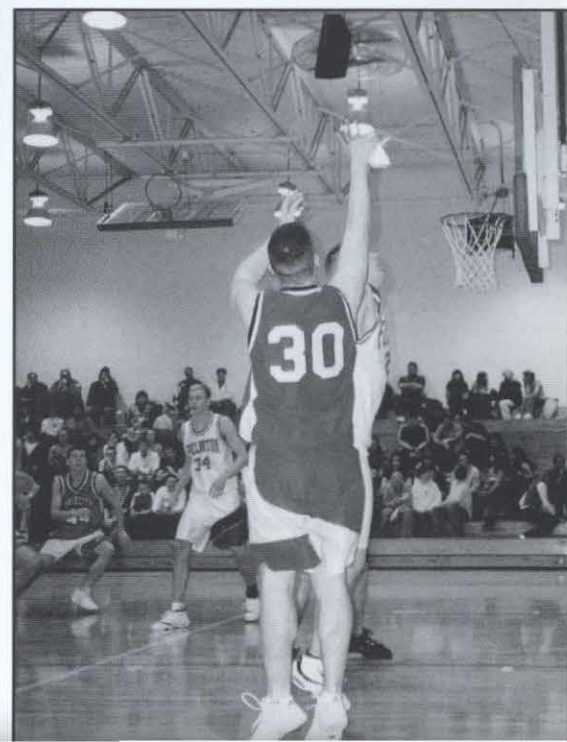

The team felt like they gained a lot of respect by never giving up and going out

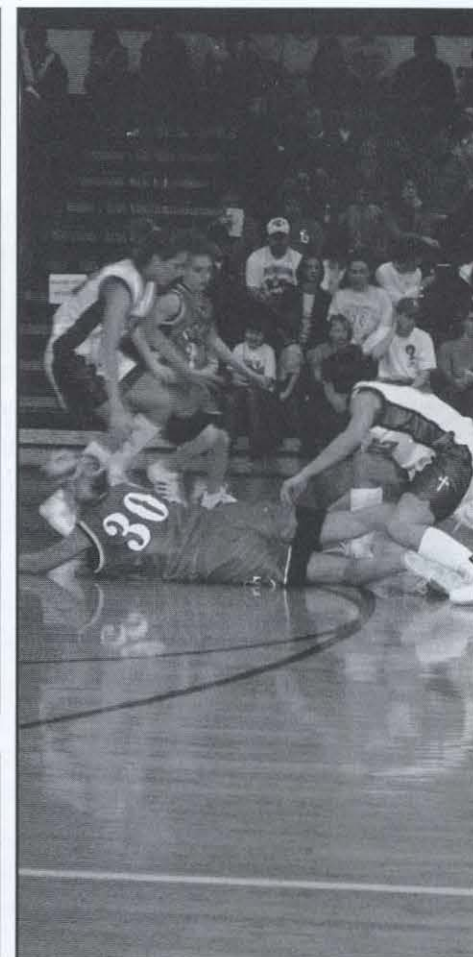
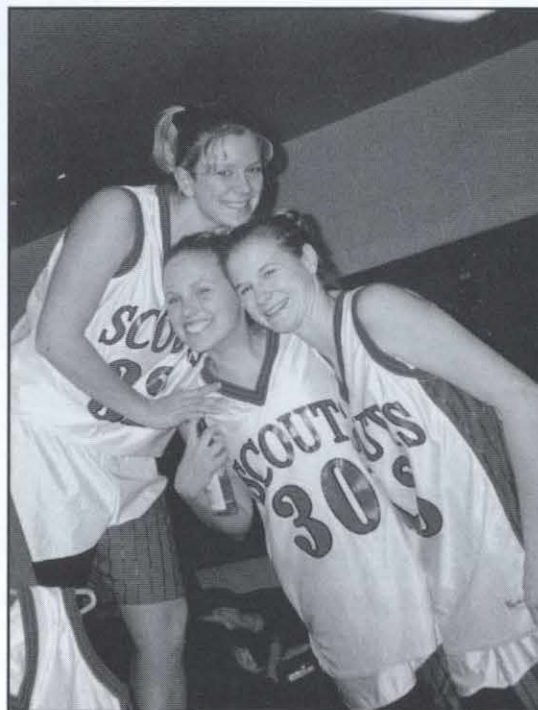
every game and giving it their all. Yet, the players felt the effect that a lack of crowd support has on the team.

JV boys basketball team had many good outcomes by the end of the season as well. The guys had a season to remember because of their effort towards wanting to win.

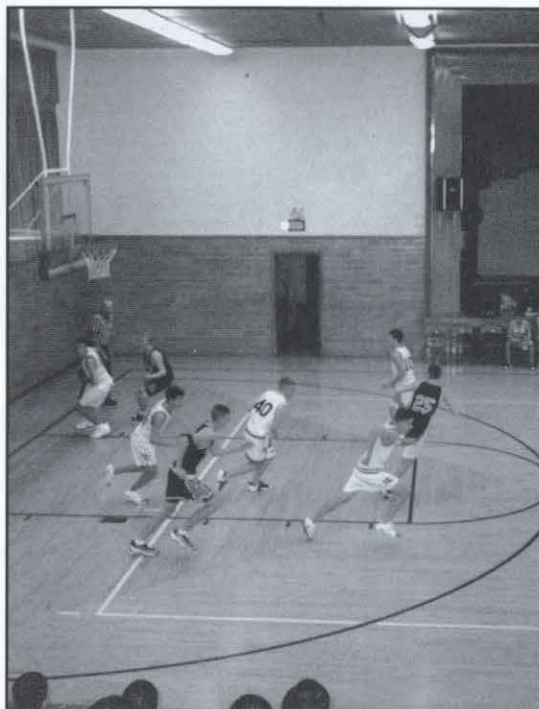

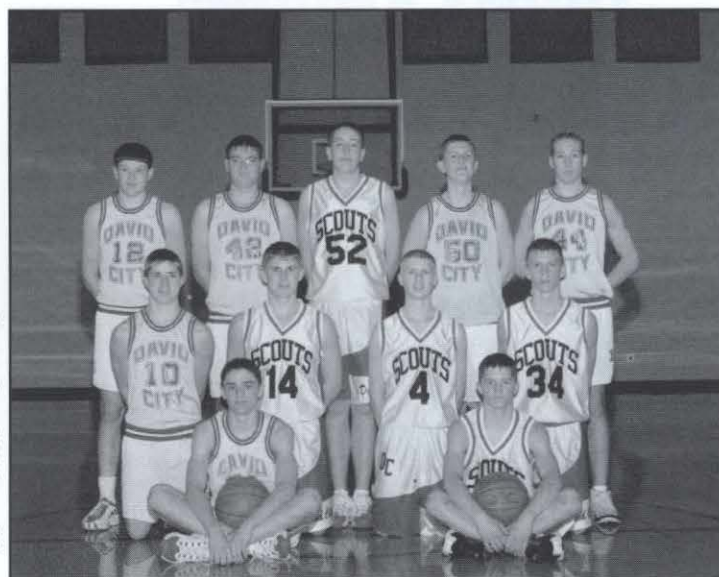

"I learned a lot this year from the seniors. It was a good chance for me to achieve my goals individually and team wise," sophomore Jeff Schmid said.

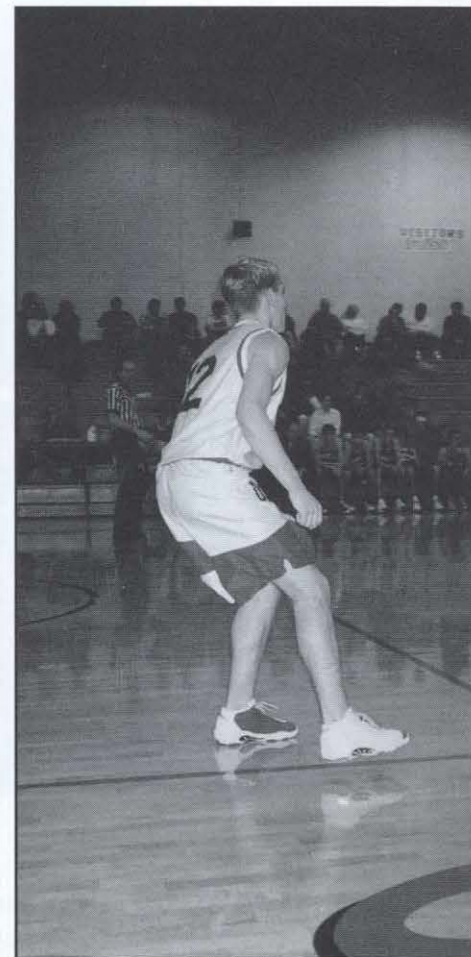

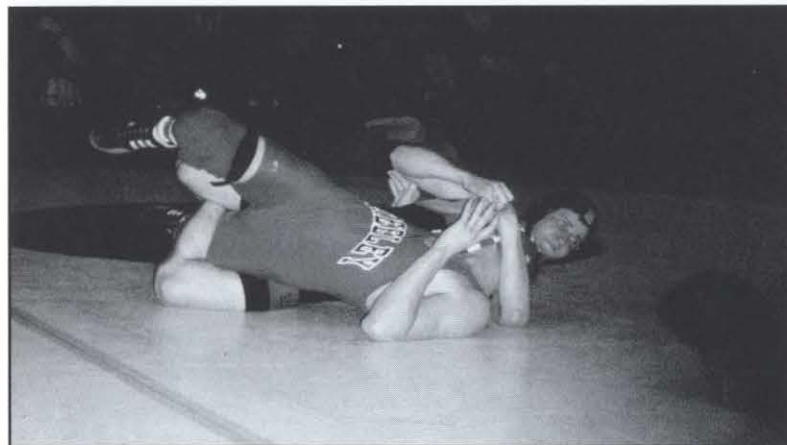

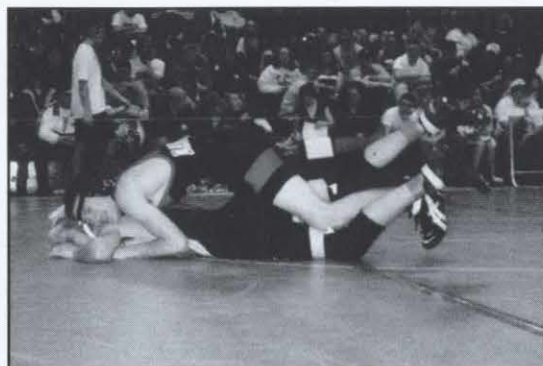
Road Trip Leads To Improvements

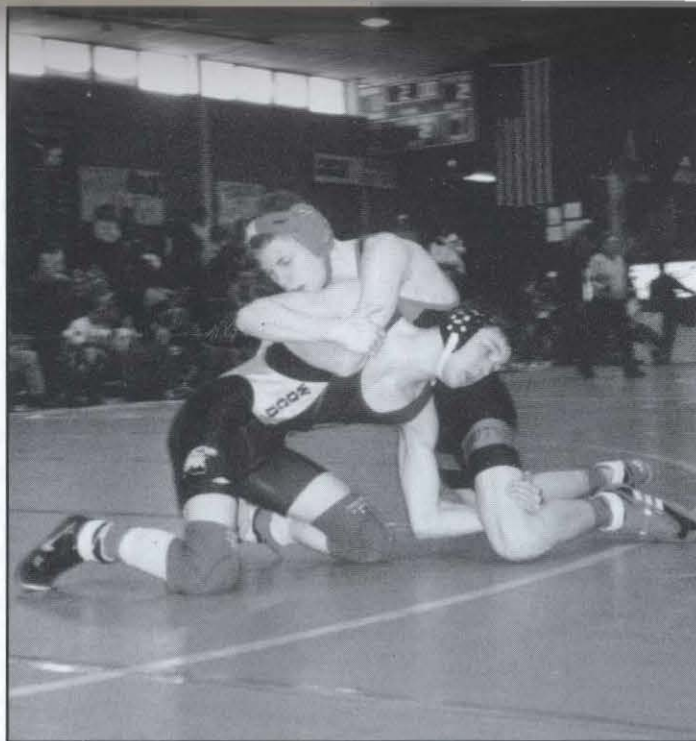

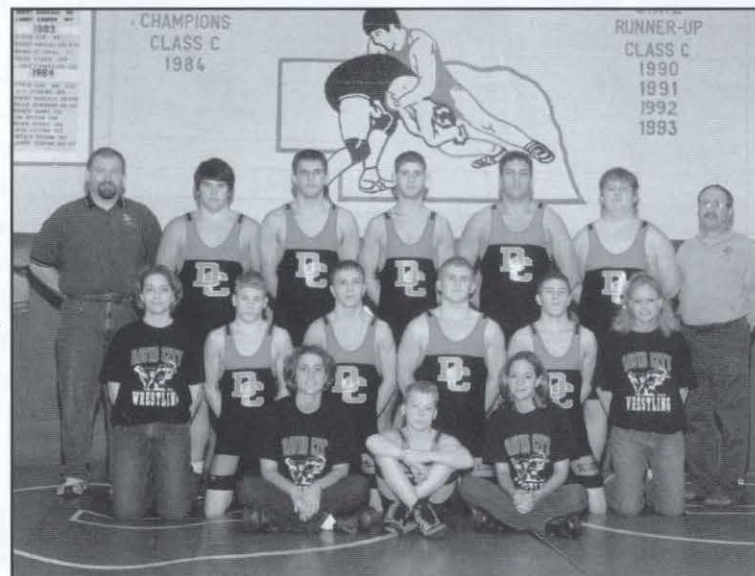

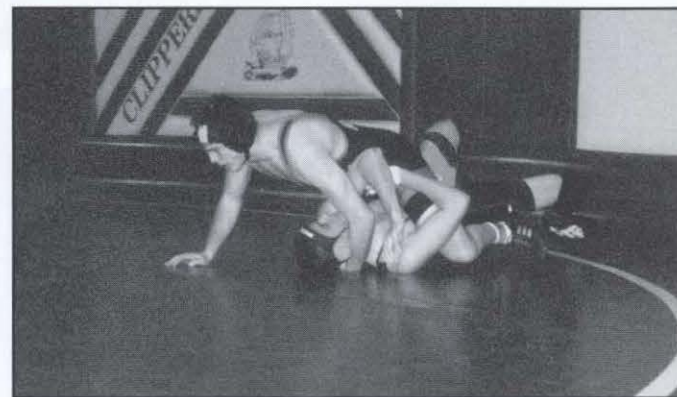

"Every time I stepped onto the mat I just thought to myself that if I just wrestled my best, I couldn't lose," Helgoth said.

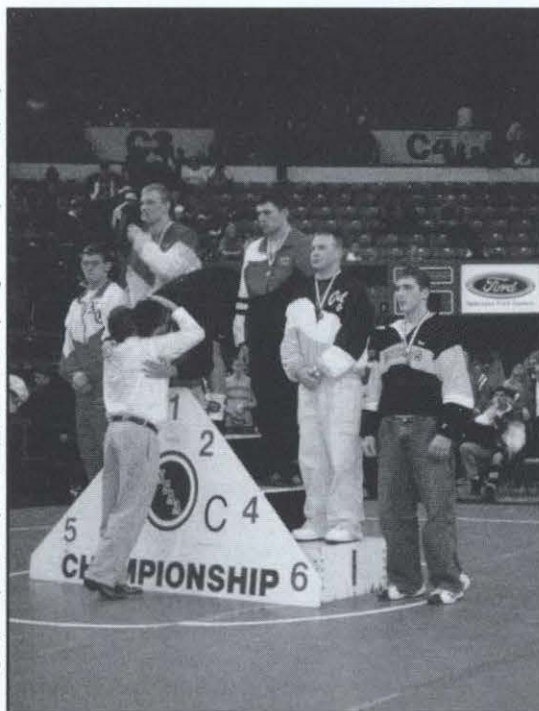
Before Tyler stepped onto the mat Mr. Kamrath said, "Being in the state finals is a chance of a life time. Don't let anyone take the state cham-

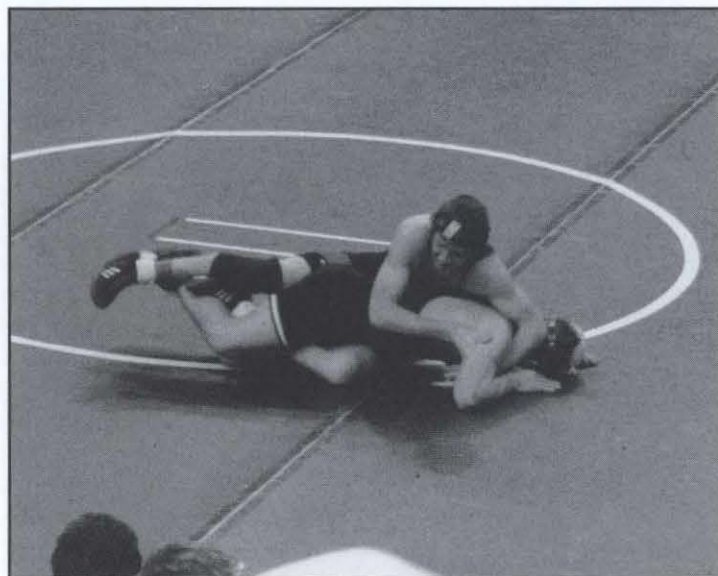

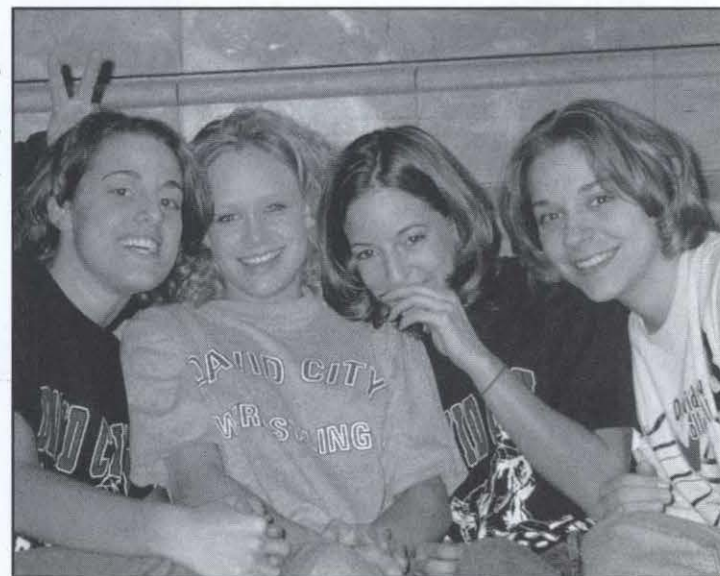

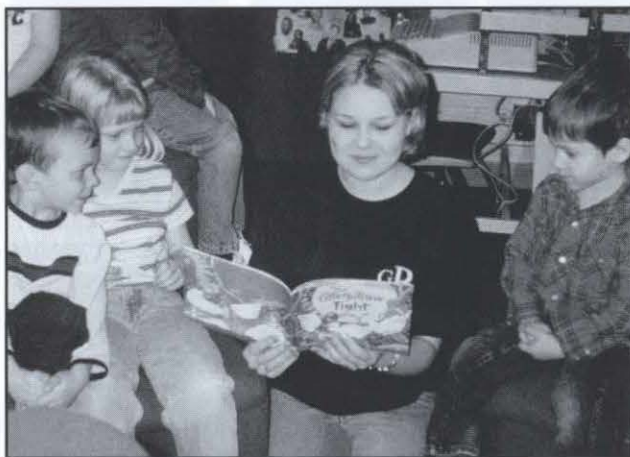

ter and leadership that must also be fulfilled. There is only a certain number of students selected each year, so being a part of this elite group is a special honor.

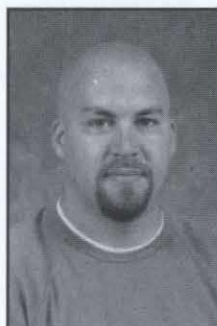
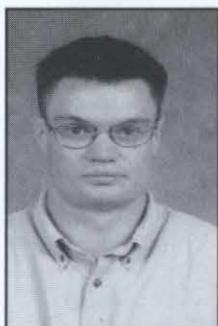
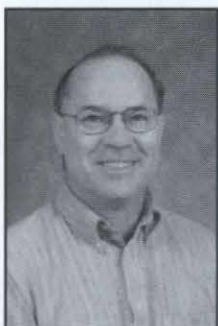

Being involved in any of these groups and clubs offered throughout high school gives students the ability to experience new events.

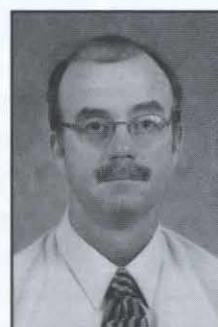
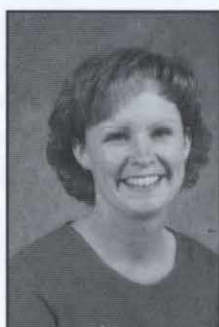
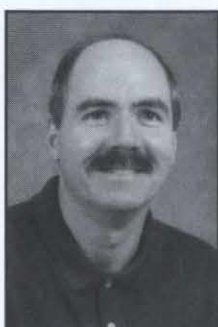

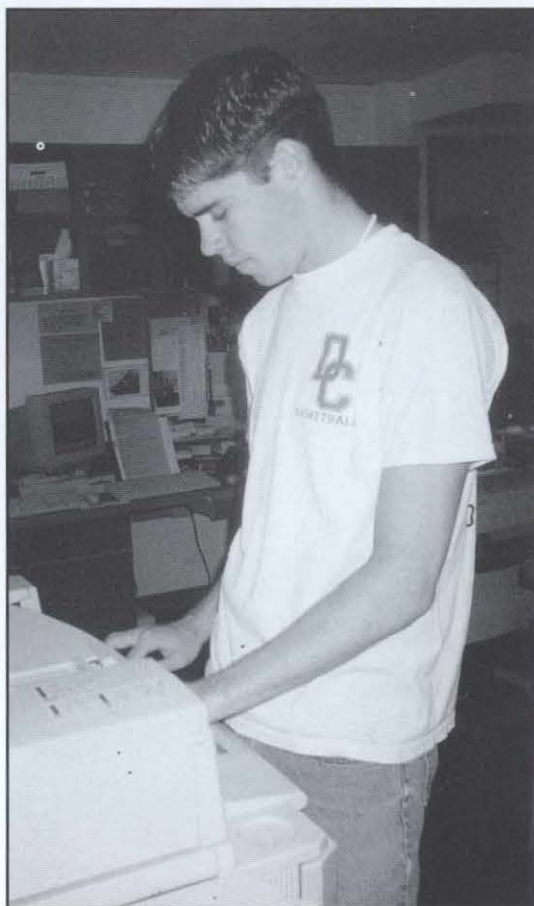

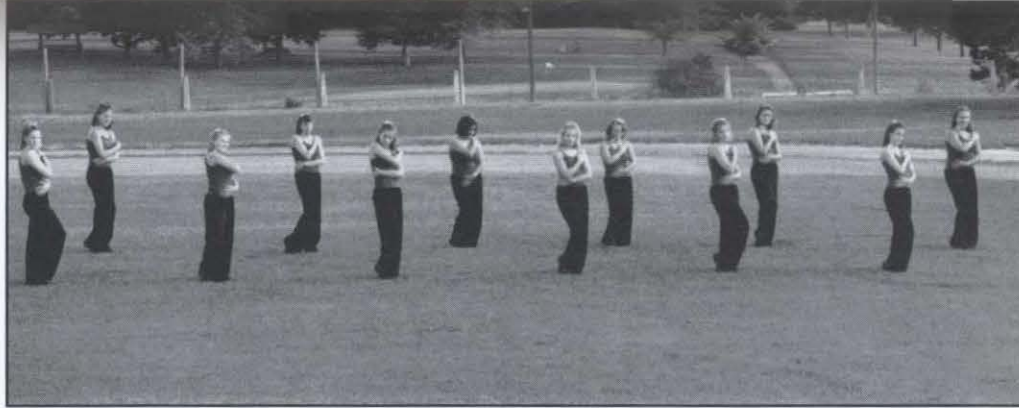

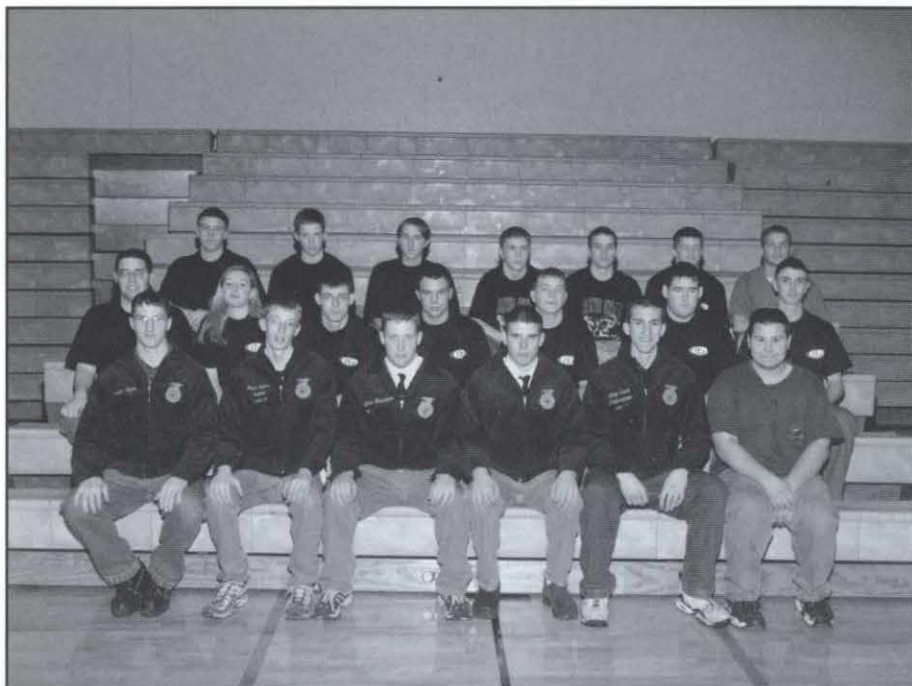

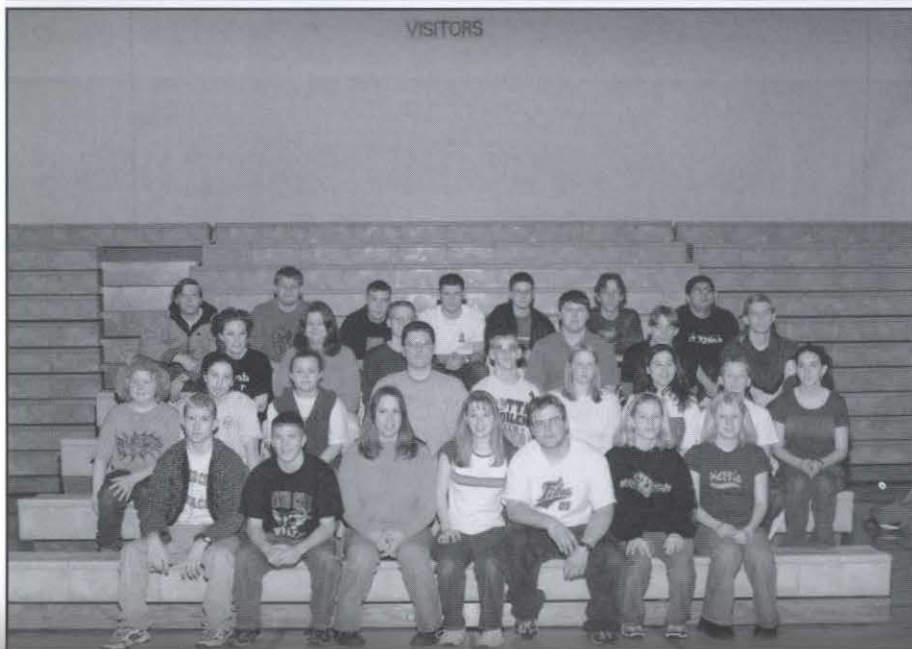
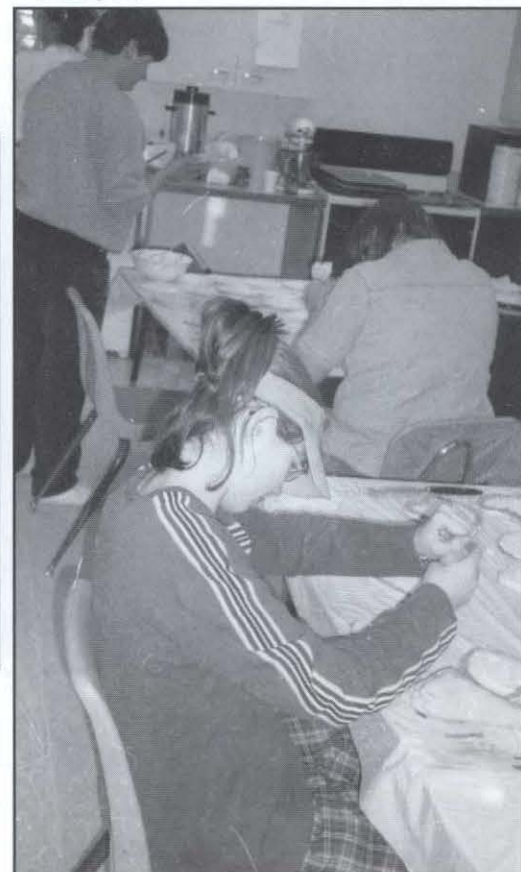

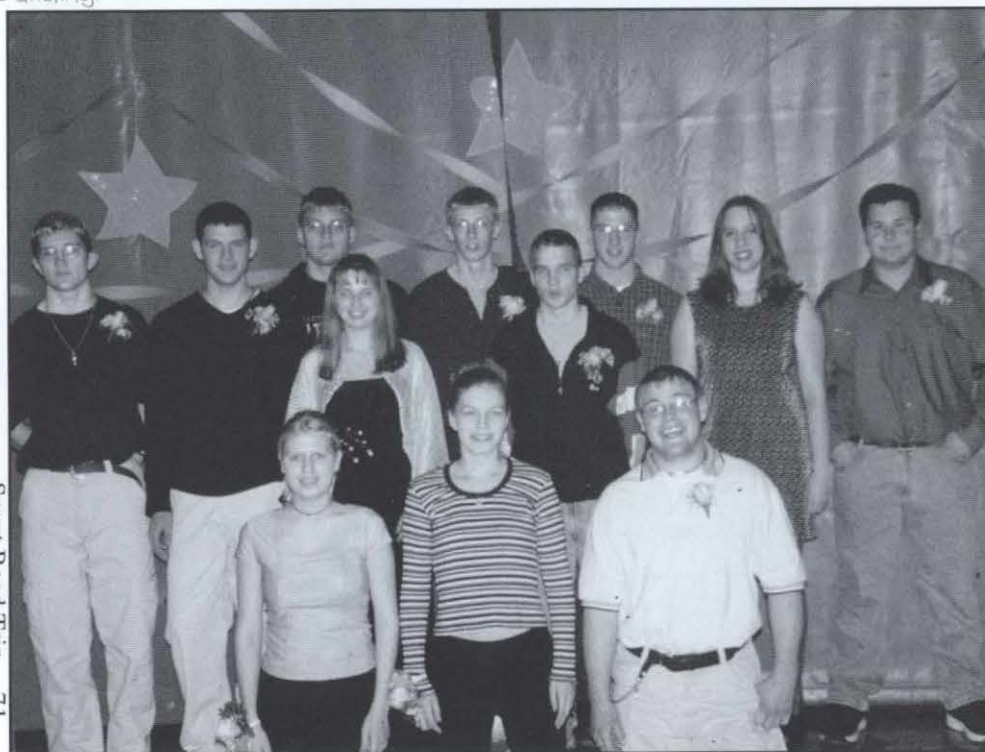

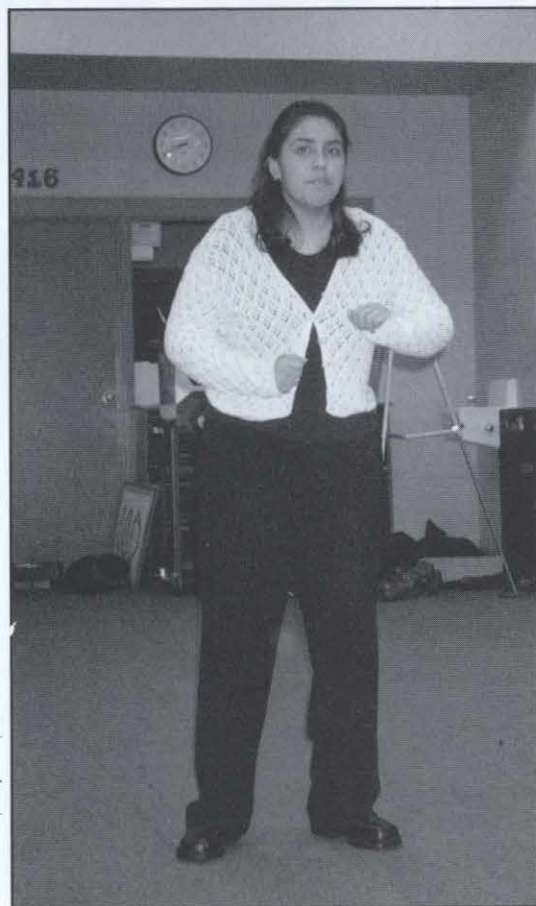

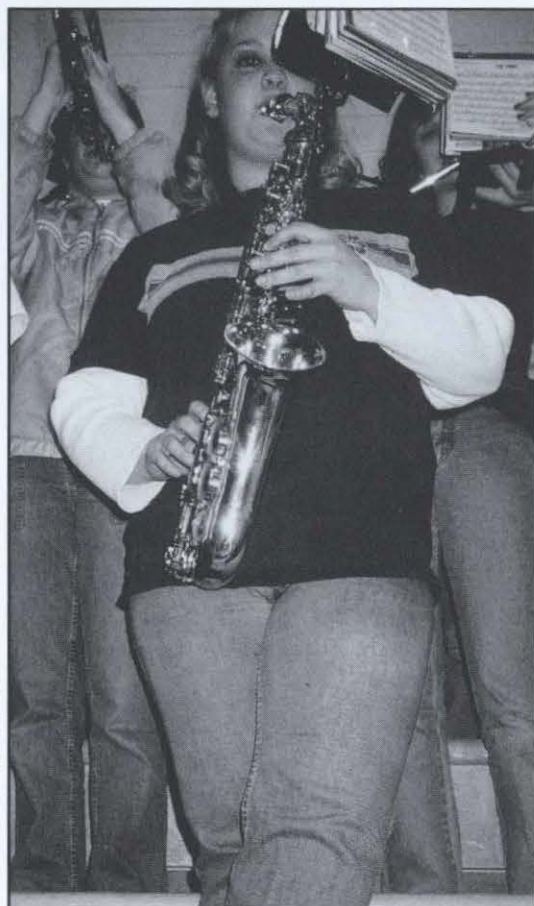

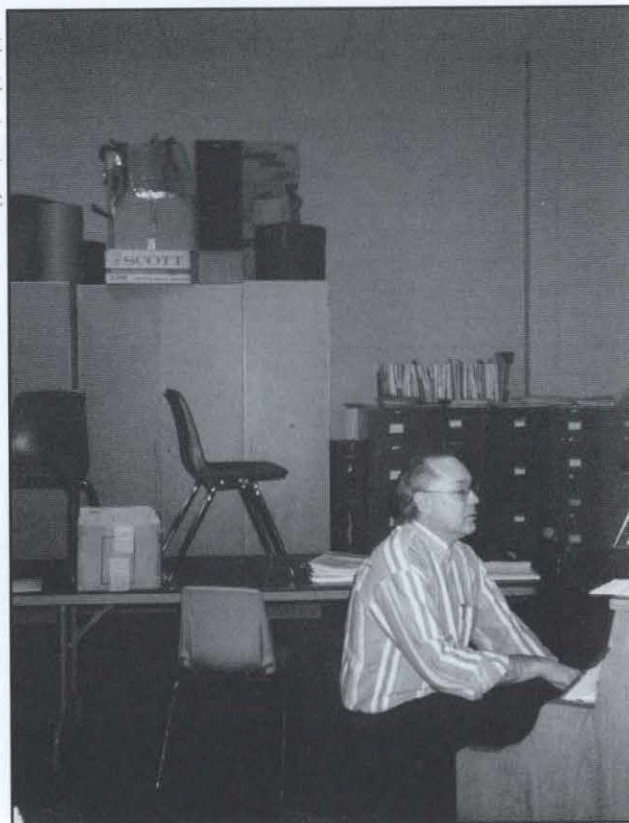

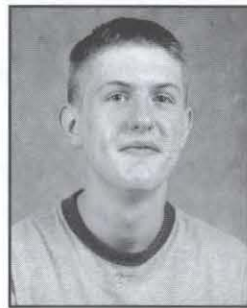

SE: So what's next?

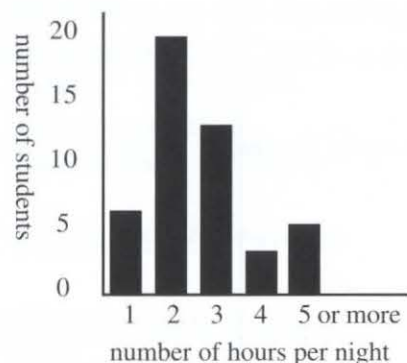
MP: I have no idea what I will be doing except I know I will NOT BE GRADING PAPERS!

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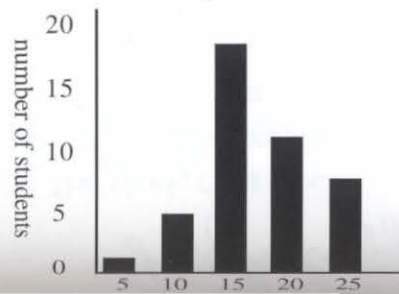
MSN Messenger

Question #2: How many people do you talk to an average each night? (45 students polled)

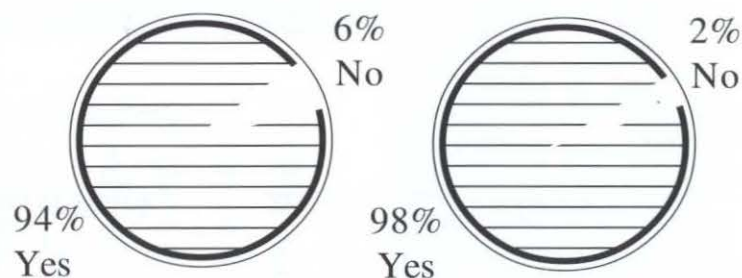

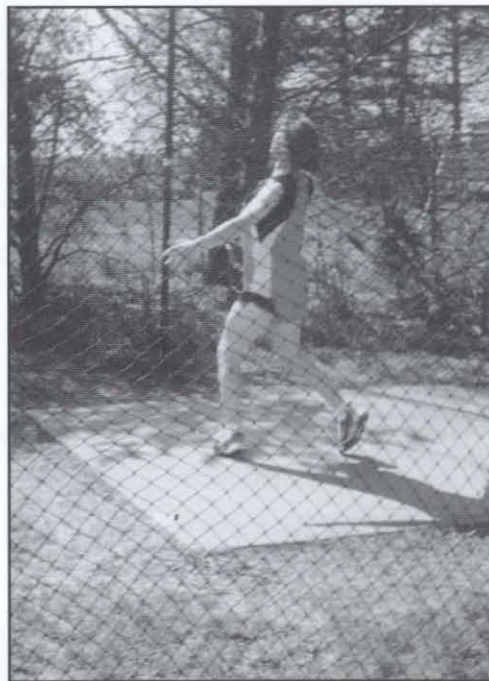
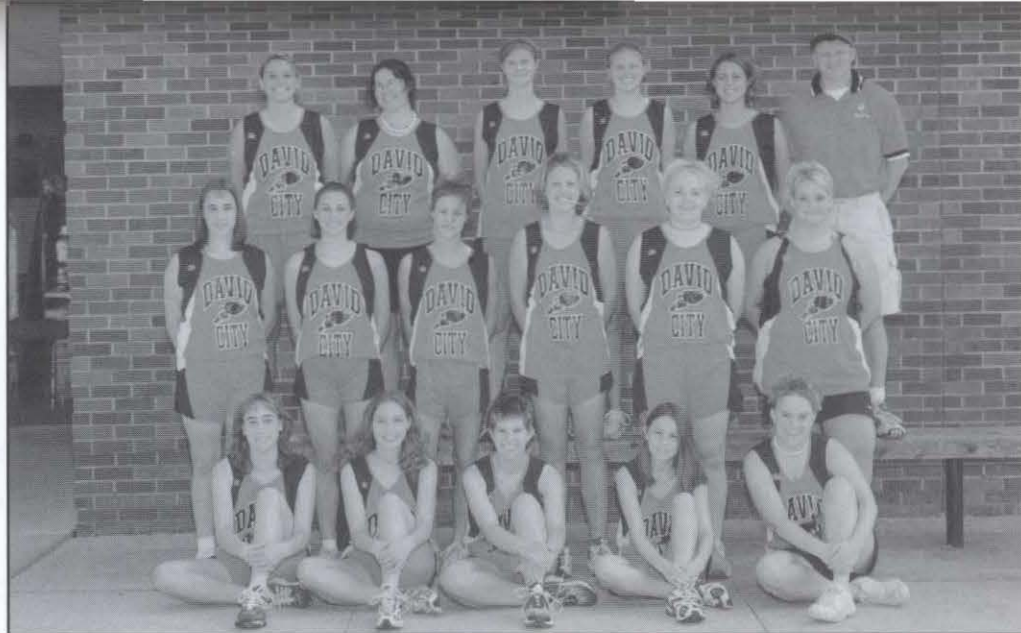

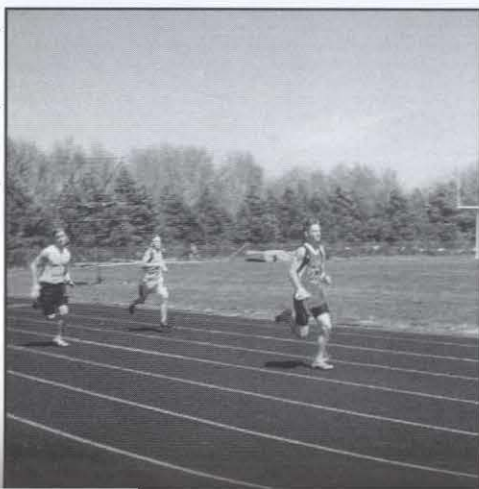
JUNIOR CAREY TROWBRIDGE BROKE THE SCHOOL RECORD IN THE 300 HURDLES.

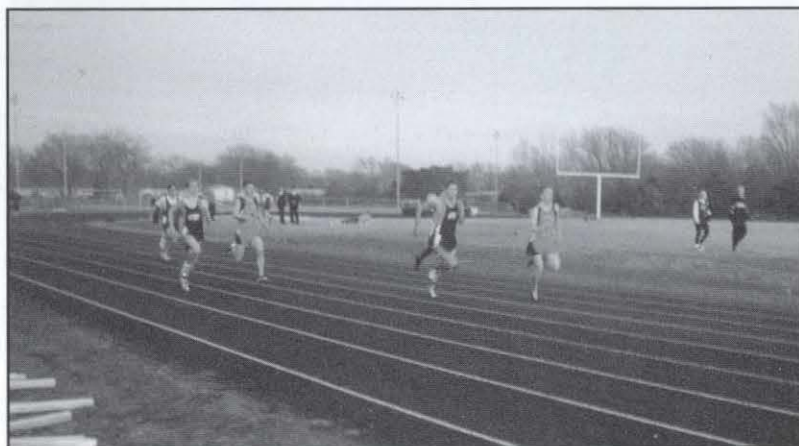

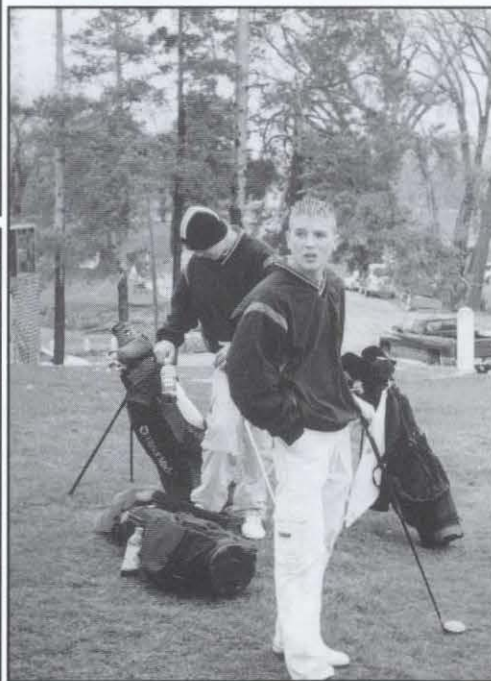

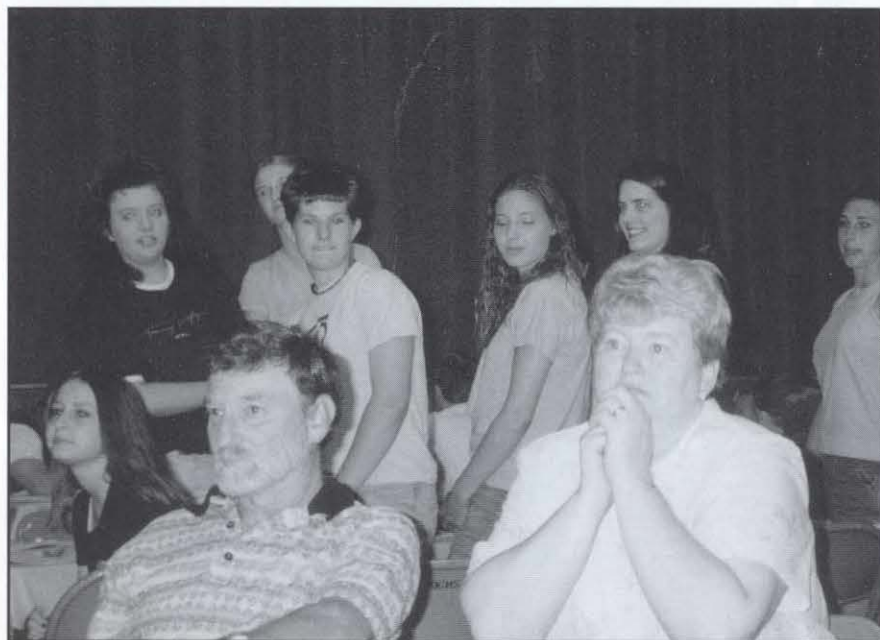

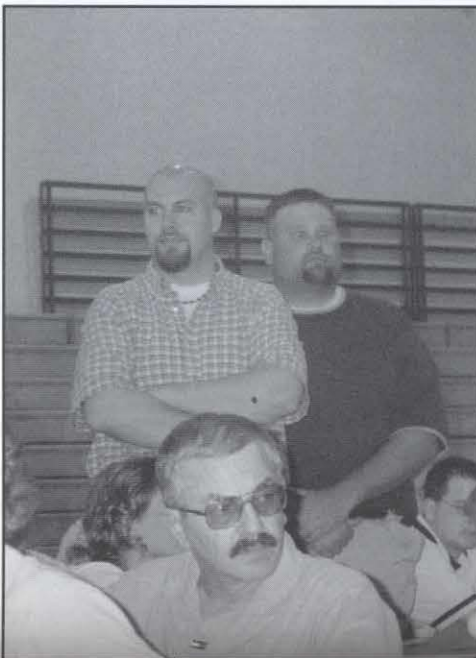

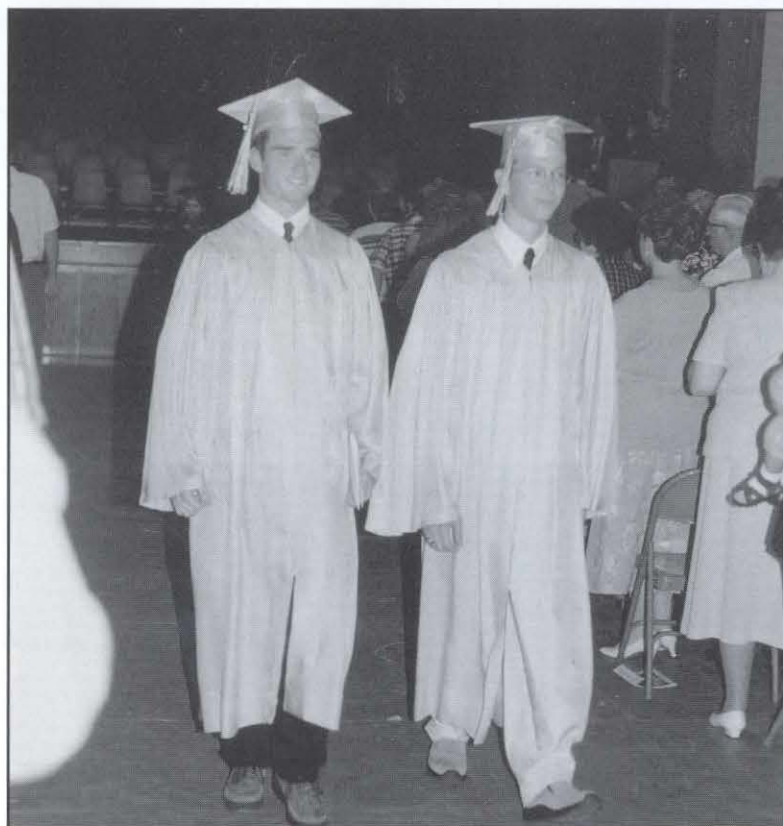

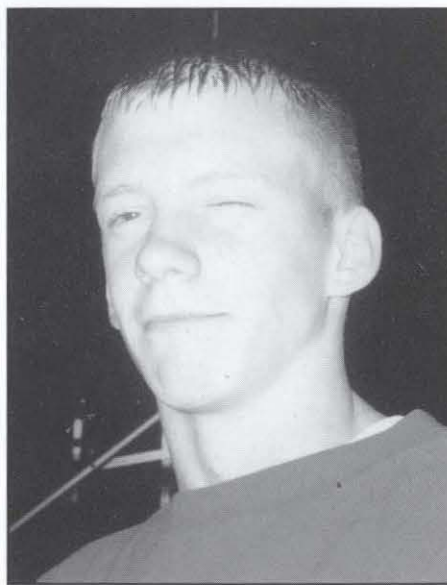
