GOING INTO THIS FOOTBALL SEASON, IT WAS OBVIOUS TO ME THAT OLR SCHEDULE WAS GOING TO BE TOUGH, BOTH IN OUR DISTRICT AND IN OUR NON-DISTRICT GAMES. THE THING 1 TOLD' PEODLE BEFORE THE SEASON WAS "IF WE CAN BEAS' TOŨGH AS OUR SCHEDULE, WE SHOULD BE FINE." THE BIGGEST QUESTION MARKI HAD WAS IN REPLACING THREE GUYS WHO I THOUGHT BROUGHT A LOT OF DHYSICAL AND MENTAL TOUGHNESS TO OUR TEAM: SETH BEHRENS, AARONRERUCHA, AND MICHAEL MCDONALO. THEY WERE OUR STARTING BACKFIEL D ON OFFENSE, AND OUR THREE STARTING LINEBACKERS ON DEFENSE. THERR PHYSICAL CONTRIBUTIONS WERE ONLY PART OF IT, THOUGH. THEY HAD UNQUESTIONABLY BEEN THE ENOTIONAL ROCK OF THE TEAM. SO, WE WERELOOKING ATGHREE BIG CHAC, LENGES: 1)A TOUGH SCHEDULE; 2)REDLACING OUTSTANDING PHYSICALTALENT; B) EINDING THE EMIOTIONAL LEAOERS OF OUR TEAM.

WE TAKE A LOT OF PRIDE IN OUR DISTRICT PERFORMANCE, AND I THOUGHT THE DISTRICT SCHEDULE STARTED AT A GOOD TIME FOR US. WE NEEDED A LTTLE SOMETHUNGTQ, GET US GOING AGAIN. LAIKEVIEW WAS BY FAR EVERYBODY'S PICKTO ẄN THE DISTRICT, AND RIGFTYY SO. WE HAD TO GO T'O THER PLACE, AND IF WE WANTED'TO WIN ANOTHER DISTRICT TITLE, IT WAS GOING TO HRVE TO BE THROUGH THEM. THAT WAS PROGABLXOUR BEST GAME IT WAS CERTAINLY THE HIGHLIGHT OF THE SEASON FOR ME, BECAUSE ONCE AGAIN, WEROSE TO THE OCCASION, WE ANSWERED QUESTIONS, AND WENETA CHALLENGE, AFTER THATT GAME, WE EELTTHAT THE DISTRICT WAS OURS:

## IN THE EYES OF HEAD

## COACH CORTNEY COUCH

THE SCOUTS FINISHED 11-13, WHICH IS ONLY THE SECOND LOSING SEASON IN THE LAST SEVEN YEARS. CERTAINLY THERE WERE SOME OBVIOUS REASONS FOR THIS. DAVID CITY LOST KE
TION AND ONLY BROUGHT BACK TWO STARTERS. THAT CAN BE TOUGF FOR ANY TEAM TO OVERCOME. ALSO, THE SCOUTS PLAYED A VERY TOUEH SCHEDULE. SIX OF DAVID CITY'S LOSSES CAME TO TEAMS IN THE TOP 12 IN NSAA POWER POINTS. THERE WAS ALSO THE ATTEMPTED CHANGE IN DEFENSIVE PHILOSOPHY, WHICH SEEMED TO WORK FOR THERESERVES AND THE OV'S, BUT BLEW UP IN THE FACES OF THE VARSITY TEAM, AND ULTIMATELYHAD TO BE ABANDONED 15 GAMES INTO THE SEASON. FINALLY, LACK OF DEPTH EARLY IN THE SEASON REALLY MADE THINGS DIFFICULTFOR STARTERS WHO RARELY GOT A BREAK
OTHER REASONS WERE MORE DIFFICULT TO EXPLAIN. DESPITE HAVING A CORE GROUP OF PLAYERS WHO HAVE PLAYED TOGETHER SINCE CHILDHOOD, CHEMISTRY AND TEANWORR WERE LACKING IN MOST GAMES. IN ADDITION, THE SCOUTS' SHOOTING PERCENTAGE WAS WELL BELOW WHAT IT WAS A YEAR AGO, WHILE OPPOSING TEAMS SEEMED TO SHOOT THE LIGHTS OUT MOST NIGHTS. IN LIGHT OF ALL THIS, THOUGH, DAVID CITY COMPETED HARD IN EVERY CONTEST. THEY NEVER GAVE UP, AND THEY ALWAYS BELIEVED THAT THEY WOULD TURN IT AROUND. WHEN THE FINAL LOSS CAME AGAINST LAKEVIEW (WHO, PREDICTABLY, HIT 11 THREE POINTERS), IT WAS A CRUSHING LOSS, BECAUSE THE SCOUTS, AS THEY DIDIN EVERY GAME THIS YEAR, EXPECTED TO WIN.
INDIVIDUALLY, IT WAS A DIFFERENT STORY. ALMOST EVERY PLAYER IN THE PROGRAM SHOWED SIGNIFICANT GROWTH ON THE FLOOR. AS A RESULT, THE RESERVE GAMES WERE MORE COMPETITIVE THAN IN PAST YEARS, THE OV TEAM HELD ITS OWN AGAINST TEAMS WHO NORMALIY OVERWHELM THEM, AND THE VARSITY TEAM HAD BETYER DEDTH AS THE SEASON WORE ON. WHILE IT CERTAINLY WAS DIFFICLILT TO SHAKE OFF THE DISAPPOINTMENT OF OUR RECIORD, THE HARD WORFR AND IMPROVE MENT BY THE PARTICIPANTS GAVE A BRIEHT OUTL OOK FOR THE FUTURE AND SENT THE SENIORS OFF WTTH THE KNOWLEDGE THAT THEY EAVE ALI THEY COULD.
