



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



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Going into this football season, it was obvious to me that our schedule was going to be tough, both in our district and in our non-district games. The thing I told people before the season was "IF we can be as tough as our schedule, we should be fine." The biggest question mark I had was in replacing three guys who I thought brought a lot of physical and mental toughness to our team. Seth Behrens, Aaron Rerucha, and Michael McDonald. They were our starting backfield on offense, and our three starting linebackers on defense. Their physical contributions were only part of it, though. They had unquestionably been the emotional rock of the team. So, we were looking at three big challenges: 1) a tough schedule; 2) replacing outstanding physical talent; 3) finding the emotional leaders of our team.




We take a lot of pride in our district performance, and I thought the district schedule started at a good time for us. We needed a little something to get us going again. Lakeview was by far every body's pick to win the district, and rightly so. We had to go to their place, and if we wanted to win another district title, it was going to have to be through them. That was probably our best game. It was certainly the highlight of the season for me, because once again, we rose to the occasion, we answered questions, and we met a challenge. After that game, we felt that the district was ours.

While we did win out and secure another district title, after the Scotus Bame, induries began to mount. Induries are the aspect of the Bame that the players and coaches don't control, so when they started to pile up on US, it seemed a little unfair. All teams go through it, but we were getting it bad. We were fortunate to win at North Gend and Limp into the playoffs as District Champs. In the first round against Aspland-Greenwood, it looked like we would be making an early exit. However, we once again metthe challenge, and notched an impressive comedack win.

BUT THE INDURIES DUST KEPT COMING, AND WHEN WE TRAVELED TO ARLINGTON FOR OUR SECOND ROUND MATCH UP, WE WERE AGLE TO RUN ONLY A FRACTION OF WHAT WE HAD RUN DUST TWO WEEKS GEFORE. IN THE EYES OF HEAD COACH CORTNEY COUCH

THE SCOUTS FINISHED 11-13, WHICH IS ONLY THE SECOND LOSING SEA-SON IN THE LAST SEVEN YEARS. CERTAINLY THERE WERE SOME OBVI-OUS REASONS FOR THIS. DAVID CITY LOST KEY PLAYERS TO GRADUA-TION AND ONLY BROUGHT BACK TWO STARTERS. THAT CAN BE TOUGH FOR ANY TEAM TO OVERCOME. ALSO, THE SCOUTS PLAYED A VERY TOUGH SCHEDULE. SIX OF DAVID CITY'S LOSSES CAME TO TEAMS IN THE TOP 12 IN NSAA POWER POINTS. THERE WAS ALSO THE ATTEMPTED CHANGE IN DEFENSIVE PHILOSOPHY, WHICH SEEMED TO WORK FOR THE RESERVES AND THE OV'S, BUT BLEW UP IN THE FACES OF THE VARSITY TEAM, AND ULTIMATELY HAD TO BE ABANDONED 15 GAMES INTO THE SEASON. FINAL-LY, LACK OF DEPTH EARLY IN THE SEASON REALLY MADE THINGS DIFFI-CULT FOR STARTERS WHO RARELY GOT A BREAK.

OTHER REASONS WERE MORE DIFFICULT TO EXPLAIN. DESPITE HAV-ING A CORE GROUP OF PLAYERS WHO HAVE PLAYED TOGETHER SINCE CHILDHOOD, CHEMISTRY AND TEAMWORK WERE LACKING IN MOST GAMES. IN ADDITION, THE SCOUTS' SHOOTING PERCENTAGE WAS WELL BELOW WHAT IT WAS A YEAR AGO, WHILE OPPOSING TEAMS SEEMED TO SHOOT THE LIGHTS OUT MOST NIGHTS. IN LIGHT OF ALL THIS, THOUGH, DAVID CITY COMPETED HARD IN EVERY CONTEST. THEY NEVER GAVE UP, AND THEY ALWAYS BELIEVED THAT THEY WOULD TURN IT AROUND. WHEN THE FI-NAL LOSS CAME AGAINST LAKEVIEW (WHO, PREDICTABLY, HIT 11 THREE POINTERS), IT WAS A CRUSHING LOSS, BECAUSE THE SCOUTS, AS THEY DID IN EVERY GAME THIS YEAR, EXPECTED TO WIN.

INDIVIDUALLY, IT WAS A DIFFERENT STORY. ALMOST EVERY PLAYER IN THE PROGRAM SHOWED SIGNIFICANT GROWTH ON THE FLOOR. AS A RE-SULT, THE RESERVE GAMES WERE MORE COMPETITIVE THAN IN PAST YEARS, THE OV TEAM HELD ITS OWN AGAINST TEAMS WHO NORMALLY OVERWHELM THEM, AND THE VARSITY TEAM HAD BETTER DEPTH AS THE SEASON WORE ON. WHILE IT CERTAINLY WAS DIFFICULT TO SHAKE OFF THE DISAPPOINTMENT OF OUR RECORD, THE HARD WORK AND IMPROVE-MENT BY THE PARTICIPANTS GAVE A GRIGHT OUTLOOK FOR THE FUTURE, AND SENT THE SENIORS OFF WITH THE KNOWLEDGE THAT THEY GAVE ALL THEY COULD.






OCARS OF THE FUTURE

UA BIEBER HOLIDAY


The raging popularity of Justin Bieber continued, as the pop star released a Christmas album, *Under the Mistletoe*, which immediately debuted at the top of the charts.

Most U.S. troops in Iraq were home by Dec. 31, ending the eight-year conflict there to fight terrorism and remove Iraqi President Saddam Hussein from power. About 100,000 U.S. troops were in Afghanistan, continuing to fight the Taliban. A few thousand of the troops that were in Iraq were to be sent to Afghanistan.



CMORE FAMILY DINNERS

More than half of all grocery shoppers cooked more meals at home, more than at any time in the last 20 years, according to *Food Technology* magazine. Eating at home is a trend that is expected to continue. Grocery stores and food companies began offering more help with meal ideas to make home cooking easier and faster.

CWEATHER RECORD

The year 2011 had a record 12 weather disasters that devastated parts of the country. These included massive flooding of the Mississippi River, a severe drought and wildfires in the southern Plains and southwest U.S., and Hurricane Irene. The National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration said the U.S. had a yearly average of five weather/ climate disasters costing more than \$1 billion between 2000 and 2009.

Two years after its launch, the makers of mobile video game app Angry Birds announced that the game had been downloaded more than 500 million times across various platforms. The success took the game mainstream, with stuffed animals, T-shirts and other products becoming popular items.

Labor negotiations were a problem for both the NFL and NBA. A lockout by NFL owners disrupted training camp, and threatened the start of the season before a very late settlement. An NBA lockout interrupted the start of basketball season, with 16 games for each team getting removed from the schedule before an agreement brokered by commissioner David Stern (pictured) was reached and the season began on Christmas Day.

OLD LIGHT BULBS DIM

The incandescent light bulb – the bulb everyone has used since it was invented by Thomas Edison – was going away. Stores began to only offer halogen incandescent, compact fluorescent and LED light bulbs. However, the U.S. Department of Energy was unable to enforce the new energy efficiency rules for most of 2012 because of a lack of money.

The third album from Selena Gomez & the Scene, called *When the Sun Goes Down* ended up becoming the best selling one yet for Gomez and her band.

Using the Kepler space observatory, NASA astronomers discovered a pair of planets roughly the same size as Earth about 950 light years away. While the temperatures on the new planets were an unlivable 1,400 degrees, their discovery brought hope that projects like Kepler will continue to successfully find new planets.




ANIMALS ON THE LOOSE




TRAGEDY ON THE TRACK

CNO LONGER A SECRET Popular ABC Family drama The Secret Life of the American Teenager capped off its third season with title character Amy Juergens accepting a marriage proposal from her boyfriend. The highly anticipated fourth season returned in March.



CLOOK OUT FACEBOOK

Google launched a new social networking website called Google+, which was designed as an atternative and competitor to Facebook. Google+ used "Circles" and "Hangouts" to categorize friends. In its first six months, Google+ attracted 90 million users.









GAMING IN 3D ■

Nintendo, released the handheld Nintendo 3DS, which was the first video game unit able to project 3D effects without the use of special glasses. More than 400,000 3DS units quickly sold out in the first week.

OSTILL A FIGHTER

Tennessee's Pat Summitt, the winningest coach in women's basketball history, announced before the start of the season that she had been diagnosed with early-onset Alzheimer's disease. Using a plan that gave more responsibility to her assistants, Summitt stayed on the job and again had the Lady Vols in the top 10.

The USDA issued new standards for school lunches beginning for the next school year, including calorie ranges for different age groups and less sodium and fat. Fruits and vegetables also must be offered, but students will not be required to take them.


ONE GOAL SHORT







UELECTION YEAR
